Articles of Interest: Suggested Haplogroups Revisited; Odds & Ends

Family Tree DNA has removed all the "suggested" haplogroups for our project. Only kit 11072, who purchased a SNP, now shows a haplogroup. I have questioned them about this, and they gave one example of someone (13584) whose results were actually ambiguous by their definition. I have not removed the "suggested" haplogroup that had already been given from the DYS Chart. However, new results will not show a "suggested" haplogroup unless those results are UNAMBIGUOUS, even if they match prior results. I am talking to them about how we should proceed, short of everyone buying a \$100 SNP.

Now that we are getting some participants who are ordering 43 marker tests from DNAHeritage, the DYS Chart, Ybase and Ystr will be the only places that results can be compared. One note is that there are now 48 possible markers to be had -- purchase of the FTDNA 37 marker kit AND the DNAHeritage 43 marker kit will yield 48 total markers. So if anyone is really interested in going this route, it's available. At present the DNAHeritage test is \$199, but there are a limited number.

There are several kits which have been mailed but not returned. If you have changed your mind about participating, please let me know so I can make a note that your line will not be participating.

This is short because time is short this week. Feedback, suggestions for topics, questions, comments, stories, ideas about lineages we need to recruit, etc. are always welcome. The more you all participate, the more valuable this will be for all of us.

Personal Stories from Our Participants: Hiram Webb Line

Having just received the full 25 marker results for our Webb DNA sample, I thought it might be helpful to let other Webb project participants know a little about the extent of what we know of our Webb line (and therefore our submission).

Although there was no very close match, our sample did have a 22/25, a 21/25, and a 19/25 match that seemed to be the closest of the other submissions so far. Since I do not know much about those lines, or most of the other ones on the site, I hope that a quick summary of our Webb line might help others who wind up with a close match.

The furthest back in time that we can trace our line is to Hiram Webb (sample #18171), who was born about 1795, probably in North Carolina (according to most of his children's census entries). The first place we have found our Hiram for certain was in 1820 on the Federal Census for Lincoln County, Tennessee (about midway on the southern border of the state). He was living very close to his father-in-law (David Harrison Blaylock) and his brother-in-law (Thomas Evans). I think it likely that he had met the Blaylocks back in North Carolina, and we do have some information that puts these Blaylocks in Montgomery County (most recently) as well as Chatham and Orange County, North Carolina.

A Hiram Webb was listed in Rhea County, (Eastern) Tennessee in 1819 (on a tax list I think), so it's possible that this was our Hiram on his way from NC farther west. But I am certainly not confident that this is our Hiram though.

After 1820, our Hiram moved to Marion County, (Northern) Alabama (modern day Lamar County), right on the border next to Itawamba and Monroe County, Mississippi. He was there in 1830, not far from a number of other Webbs, though we do not know if he was for certain related to any of them. He had not been living near any other Webbs in Lincoln County, Tennessee (unfortunately for our tracking of him), and we do not know of any other brothers or his parents' names. We think he had a sister named Mary, who was married to Thomas Evans, the same one Hiram was living next to in 1820 in Lincoln County. But that is the extent of our knowledge of his relations. Hiram died in 1838, relatively young, and did not pass any further information about his life or kin down to his descendants.

We might gain some information from his children's names (in order of birth):

We know these were all his children, and we have tracked most of them down. More information on Hiram Webb and his descendants can be found at:

Please feel free to contact me if you have any questions or suggestions about this line. We have filled out much more of a picture of Hiram over the last few years, but for at least fifty years of genealogical research, our line has been stuck trying to figure out who his father was or where he came from. We hope that DNA testing will eventually give us leads to tie him into another family in NC or VA.

Articles of Interest: Ancestral Signature (AS)

Definition: The set of DYS values that most likely represents the original ancestor.

Case Studies (2) from the WEBB study:

1. John Webb (1717?-1794, Richmond Co, NC) - Archer Webb (c. 1810, NC - GA) - Jesse Levy Webb (1809, Warren Co., TN-) - John Roach Webb (1770, NC? - TN) - Chesley Webb (1772 - 1842) - John M. Webb (1820 -)

I wrote Family Tree asking for their read on this group of lineages. I had two basic questions. The first was the Haplogroup: would ONE SNP for the group suffice to place them all in the same Haplogroup. The answer to that was "yes." Therefore, it might be worthwhile for the group to "chip in" and order one SNP among them to confirm the "I" suggested haplogroup. With six participants, that should come out to about \$16.67 each.

The second question: "Are we correct in thinking this is a related group of persons" The answer to that is also Yes. In his answer, Bennett Greenspan suggested that the Ancestral signature is probably the values shown for Jesse Levy Webb, with one exception - the AS probably had a 16 at 464d. Therefore, the AS for this group of six is probably

I am working on an Excel sheet for this group based on a timeline. I'm doing this because I'm a curious sort, not because I'm trying to "take over" anybody's research. Mostly I am experimenting with different ways to look at the data to find a way that is most useful. When I have this worksheet done to my satisfaction, the researchers in this group are certainly welcome to it, as is anyone else who thinks it might provide a structure they can use in their analysis/research.

2. Most of the rest of the WEBBs from Hiram down through the Elias Webb group of 5 have very similar values but not in the "closely related" range of 23/25 or better. I asked Family Tree if it's possible that these WEBBs might have a common origin in England given that many are in the 19/25 - 22/25 range. His response was that they are probably not related (other than the matching pairs/groups), or, if they are, we are missing the "man in the center." Perhaps some of our outstanding samples will make this clearer. For the time being however, we should consider ONLY the 24/25 and 25/25 matches as related groups and the rest as "unmatched."

Personal Stories from Our Participants: Sir Henry Webb Line

OK, so this is my story (again). You have only yourselves to blame for not sending in something for the newsletter!

We have what appears to be DNA corroboration of the Robert Webb Dickins book, or part of it. This DNA also corroborates a childhood memory I have, which nobody in my family can corroborate, that must date from the period of June - September, 1957, when I was barely four. My grandfather Webb was getting something from the refrigerator, and I was "hanging on" to him. My grandmother Webb must have been "talking family" because I asked him "Where is your family from?" He said "Oh I don't know much about them. I remember something about three brothers." "But are they from England?" I persisted. "Oh I think we came from Warwickshire...or was it Worcestershire?" he grinned as he pulled out a bottle of Worcestershire sauce. I can date the memory because my family moved into this house where I now live in June, 1957, and my beloved "DeeDee" died in September of that year. This also tells you how early I got my start in genealogy as well! By that tender age of four, I already knew my grandmother Webb's birth family back to Pittsylvania County, Virginia.

One of our participants hails from Jonathon Webb 1675 CT, a descendant of Sir Henry Webb of Dorsetshire, England. His family wound its way up to Canada and back down into the US.

Jonathon Webb 1675 CT is descended from one of Sir Alexander Webb's 4 sons who came to the Colonies in 1629, from Warwickshire. Three of them went to Boston and CT. The fourth was William Micajah Webb, who went to Isle of Wight County, VA.

My line dead ends at a brick wall with the birth of Elias Webb c. 1785 in NC or GA. I have three "suspects," but no proof of any kind. Even if I could prove that generation, I would only be back to about 1750/60.

Robert Dickins Webb wrote the following:

At McComb City, Miss, is still another family, that of Mrs. Sampson C. Webb. His greatgrandfather, Ricy Webb, lived in North Carolina, and his grandfather was James Webb, and his father was the Rev. Samuel Bozeman Webb, who moved to

Georgia where he was four times married. Dr. Sampson Webb was the son of the third wife, Cynthia Yarbrough. He married his cousin, the daughter of Britain Ricey Webb, who was the Secretary of State of Mississippi under Gov. Pettus, and died in 1861. They moved from Georgia to Alabama in 1858. He had a kinsman, Major G. F. Webb, who lives in Liberty, Miss. The sons of B. R. Webb, A. G. Webb, and B. R. Jr live in Baird Texas

These are doubtless all of the original Smithfield stock of Webbs.

Now this account is full of documentable errors, one being that Britain Ricey Webb died in 1860, not 1861. Rev. Samuel Bozeman Webb is generally held to be the son of Jesse Webb, not James (unless the name was James Jesse or Jesse James, which has never been documented). Nevertheless, we do suspect that Dr. Sampson Webb and his wife were cousins, although another account says they were not related.

Britain Rice Webb, the Secretary of State of Mississippi (quite briefly) is the eldest son of Elias Webb, my ancestor. Ricey Webb is one of the three candidates for the father of Elias, and he was indeed in NC in the 1790 Census, but he is in Jefferson Co., GA by 1797 or so. One note in the Franklin County, NC court records has Rice Webb attending to the estate of William Webb. Another Franklin County deed refers to "Micajah Webb's line." So there are some hints that Elias's line might be tied into the William Micajah Webb line of Virginia, but no evidence that we have yet been able to uncover.

Imagine my surprise when the Jonathon Webb 1675 CT/Sir Henry Webb DNA was a 32/37 match (21/25, 11/12)! After consultation with Family Tree DNA, we believe this is a relationship, although FTDNA thinks we have not yet gotten a sample from the "center." Therefore, we are seeking yet more samples from both the "northern" and "southern" branches of the Sir Henry Webb to find that center.

Articles of Interest: What if I never get a match?

There are three basic reasons one might never get a match.

1. Your ancestor was the only son to live to maturity and produce male offspring who produced a continual line of males. He might have been an only son. He might have been the only one to live to maturity, marry and reproduce. That is, his brothers might have died in infancy, young adulthood, from accident, illness or war. His brothers' might have been childless, or his brothers' lines might have "daughters out," that is reached a generation in which no sons were produced at all.
2. A non-paternity event in your line OR in the brothers' lines.
3. We simply have not recruited a sample from an appropriate line.

Obviously the project can do nothing about 1 & 2. However, we can do our best to recruit as many WEBB samples as we can. Some of you have been quite aggressively recruiting samples from lines you think might be related, or lines that are in the same geographic areas your line occupies. I have made uncounted phone calls and sent uncounted emails to WEBBs I have located through the White Pages, AOL Member Directory, and Googling the Internet for WEBBs. And some of you are lurking around reading the results or working only on your own little branches or with only the people with whom you connect.

Sadly, some of the lines we might most wish to have samples from -- those long, well documented lines -- have little incentive to spend the money. Their feeling seems to be "I know my genealogy." However, we CAN enroll them if we make it cost them little to nothing. That is one reason the scholarship fund is vital to ALL of us. There are enough of us now that donations under \$10 add up really fast. Not counting my phone & mail expenses, I am funnelling about \$10 a month

It also makes WEBB mtDNA samples more important. If you have an all female line that goes back to a WEBB wife or daughter, we MAY be able to match up some sisters from those "daughters out" lines. Or maybe you know a researcher who has such a line. It is also possible to document the DNA of BOTH sides of a couple if we can recruit both a Y-DNA donor and an mtDNA donor.

It also makes your assistance in efforts beyond your own research important. Reach out to WEBBs in your phone book. When you travel -- copy the page of WEBBs, write down the area codes where necessary, and mail them to me. (If anyone has an outgoing WATS line and would like to make calls, just let me know!) Check to see if your server has some way to search the folks on it. What about those WEBBs you meet in the course of your daily lives, or those in your research who fail to connect with you? MENTION it in your emails! Set up a signature line. Search the internet. Post on county, state, national websites.

The more WE learn, the more YOU learn! The more YOU help, the more WE learn!

The following is quoted from THE BOOK OF RAGAN/REAGAN by Donald Reagan:

Sometime during the Fall of 1777 or the Winter of 1778, Doctor Martin Shultz and his growing family began to make preparations for the journey to Washington County, North Carolina (not Tennessee). By the early Summer of 1778, they had made the trek, and when they arrived there, they settled 'on the south side of Holston River adjoining Samuel Smith's line and John Webb's line' in Washington County.

Martin appeared on the 1779 tax list of Washington County, North Carolina (now Tennessee with 200 acres of land, value of land - 150 Pounds, 6 horses, valued at - 650 Pounds, 6 cattles, valued at - 60 Pounds, his ready money, 60 Pounds 6 Shillings, a total value of 920 Pounds 6 Shillings. On the same tax list of said county, Edward Little entered another tract of land in Doctor Martin Shultz name - 150 acres of land, value of land - 20 Pounds.

Doctor Martin Shultz made an entry for 200 acres of land in Washington County, North Carolina (now Tennessee) on Thursday, 19 August 1779. A survey's warrant for te County Surveyor in said county was not issued until late November of that year by John Carter. After the division of Washington County in 1779, the warrant was forwarded to the County Surveyor of Sullivan County, North Caroline (now Tennessee) to be surveyed. In this land entry in Washington County, Martin is again named as 'Doctor Martin Shults'. This also verifies family traditions and it refutes statements of early East Tennessee historians that there were 'no trained physicians' in the area in the early days.

After Sullivan County was created in late 1779, all later records of the family were found there.

Personal Stories from Our Participants: How Long Have We Been Related?

Many of you have written commenting on all the lines shown as unrelated, mentioning that this one and that are "supposed to be related" or pointing out that these three lines are "very close." This prompted me to take another hard look at the unrelated lines.

My first comment is that these are almost all R1b. MOST R1bs match on MOST of the markers. So matching on a lot of these markers doesn't necessarily indicate a recent close relationship. It is very difficult to nail down anything unless there is a 25/25 or better match. For that reason, we have "ungrouped" some people, notably the Stephen Webbs.

There is a lot of current research interest in trying to identify sub-groups within R1B, with some success. One researcher has identified three main varieties of R1b Haplotypes (remember a haplotype is your entire STRING OF VALUES!), based on the values of DYS 390,391, and 392.

A. Truncated Atlantic Modal DYS390=24 DYS 391=11 & DYS392 = 13. Of all R1bs, the highest percentages are found in Spain (67%), France (61%), Ireland (57%), London (53%), the Rhine (51%), Scandinavia (51%) and Eastern Europe (51%). In all these areas, it is more than 50% of all R1bs. It is only 40-49% of Germania, Anglo-Saxony, and North Italia R1bs.
NOTE: Y5959, 14416, 23698, 18737, 11121, 5476, 14391, 16708, 23550, 6917, 4909 fit this group

B. DYS390=24, DYS391=10 & DYS392=13 This is spread rather evenly over Europe, making up from 20 - 28% of the R1b. Oddly, the highest percentage is in London! The lowest percentages are in Anglo-Saxony and Scandinavia (20%) and Eastern Europe.
NOTE: We have Y6006, 18171, 18207, 14926, 17276, and UJC993 which fit this category.

C. "Continental Variety" DYS390=23 DYS391=11 & DYS392=13 This is found in its highest concentration in the Anglo-Saxony area of Europe (40%, as many as the A type) and its next highest in Southeast Germania (35%), followed by 31% in Northeast Germania, 29% in Scandinavia, 28% in South Germania, 28% in Eastern Europe, 25% in North Italia, and 22% in Rhine area. London has 19%, Ireland 18%, and France has only 13%. The lowest of all is found in Spain,, where this type is only 11% of all the R1b.
NOTE: Our 18106, 21809, 18180 & 18770 fit this category.

I have spent a lot of time looking at the group 4909, 5476, 6917, 11121, 14391, 14416, 16708, 16833, 17254, 18319, 18737, 19037, 20764, & SVA375:

The group probably has a common ancestor since the beginning of the Christian Era (within the last 2000 years), according to Bennett Greenspan. He suggests that it was before the taking of surnames. Some cursory exploration of some of the databases

does show (using only 9 or 10 markers) other surnames which share the same values of the markers. I need to do some more exploration here using more markers.

Some of the ungrouped may move into a group with further data. Please be patient while we upgrade and await further tests.
