There is also a "D" type, most recently hypothesized, found mostly in SE Germany and into Austria, but which is found in decreasing %s as one moves toward E. Europe or Iberia. It is not yet clear whether this group is a true group, or mutations from A and/or C. The above kits, along with 18592 actually belong to a "D" group.

Left. Col. Walter Chiles, born in England, who emigrated to Jamestown prior to 1638. He sailed to Virginia in his own ship with his wife Elizabeth, sons William and Walter, and four other persons: Henry Fulton, John Shaw, John Govey, and Sarah Cole.

For these emigrants he was awarded 400 acres in Charles City County, now Prince George, Virginia, near the falls of the Appomattox River. The stipulation was as follows: 50 acres being due for his own adventure, 50 for his wife Elizabeth, 50 for son William, 50 for son Walter, and 200 for the transportation of four other persons to the colony.

On May 2, 1638, he received a further grant of 250 acres on the Appomattox River (land book 551 and 625). This grant was described as westerly from ye river and easterly, upon the land of Edward Tunstall. He received 50 acres for his own personal adventure and 200 for the transportation of four other persons: William Webb, Stephan Corris, John Kimberlin, and Ann Polory.

An act for deviding Lower Norfolk County.

FORASMUCH as by the largness of the county of lower Norfolke, many inconveniences are found by the inhabitants ... it is hereby enacted, That the said county of lower Norfolke shall be divided and made into two counties in manner following, that is to say, beginning at the new inlet of Little Creeke, and so up the said Creeke to the dams between Jacob Johnson and Richard Drout, and so out of the said dams up a branch, the head of which branch lyeth between the dwelling house of William Moseley, senr. and the new dwelling house of Edward Webb, and so to run from the head of the said branch on a direct line to the dams at the head of the Easter branch of Elizabeth river, the which dams lie between James Kemp and Thomas Ivy, and so down the said branch to the mouth of a small branch or gutt that divides the land which Mr. John Porter now lives on, from the land he formerly lived on, and so up the said small branch according to the bounds of the said plantation, where the said Porter now liveth, and from thence to the great swamp, that lyeth on the East side of John Showlands, and so along the said great swamp to the North river of Corotucke, and down the said North river to the mouth of Simpsons creeke, and so up the said creeke to the head thereof, and from thence by a south line to the bounds of Carolina, and that this devison shall be, and remaine the bounds between the said two counties, ... and that the uppermost of the said two counties, in which Elizabeth river and the branches thereof are included, doe retain and he ever hereafter called and known by the name of Norfolk countie, and that the other of the said two counties be called and known by the name of Princess Ann County; ...

9 Feb 1685/6 Deed: Richard Reynolds to William Murfrey, both of Isle of Wight, no compensation noted, 100 acres in the lower parish (being land conveyed by Richard Webb to Richard Gadsbey and now in the occupation of said William Murfrey)...”wherefor was required thereunto as for Eliza. my wife”. Witness: John Nevill and Robert Driver. Signed: Richard Reynolds, Eliza. (x) Reynolds. Recorded 9 Feb 1685/6 on oath of Richard and Eliza his wife. [Isle of Wight Deed Book 1, p216]

This is clearly Richard Reynolds the younger. The land is evidently his wife’s from her father’s estate. Ten years later when Murphrey sold the land, he described it as half of a 200-acre parcel adjoining Thomas Bombridge deceased, John Askew and the Meadow Swamp. Meadow Swamp seems to be what is now called Cohoon Swamp, several miles south of Cypress Creek.

An interesting connection: I can find no patent to Richard Webb, but there is a later deed by John Askew’s heir, and witnessed by Murfrey’s grantee, which refers to “Richard Webb’s land originally taken up by Richard Staples” bordering the Meadow Swamp. The land Richard Reynolds is selling to William Murfrey is evidently quite near this land, or perhaps part of it. That raises the question of whether there was some relationship between Richard Staples and George Williams.

Oct 1681 Deed: John Byneham and wife Rosamond Byneham to William Webb of Isle of Wight County, 100a. on the west side of the branch sd. Byneham now lives on, part of his patent of 23 April 1681. Signed Jno: (x) Byneham, Rosamond (x) Byneham. Witness: Robert Ruffin, Samuel Thompson. [Surry County Deed Book 2, p?] Acknowledged in court on 1 November 1681 by Jno. Byneham and his wife Rosemond Byneham.

John Bynum used the same mark as in the 1679 sale, but Rosamond this time used a Latin “RB” as her mark.

The abstracted version of this deed says it is for 205 acres, but it actually reads as 100 acres out of a patent for 205a. William Webb would retain this land and will it to his son Richard Webb.

2 Oct 1684 Deed: John Byneham and wife Rosamond Byneham to William Webb of Isle of Wight County, acreage not clear, part of his patent of 23 April 1681. Signed Jno: (x) Byneham, Rosamond (x) Byneham. Witness: Thomas Taber, Silvestera? Hill. [Surry County Deed Book 3, p9] Acknowledged in court on 4 November 1684 by Jno. Byneham and his wife Rosamond Byneham.

This is apparently a sale of the second half of the 1681 patent, since part of it has already been sold to William Webb three years earlier. However, it is possible that this is a very delayed lease and release and the sale is actually the same land as in the 1681 deed. John Bynum Sr. does appear to still be living on or near this land several years later.

20 Apr 1713 William Bynum, Thomas Collier Jr. witnesses to deed from Robert and Ann Webb to Gregory Rawlings. [Surry County Deed Book 6, p148]

This and the reference below to the resale of this land are apparently to William Bynum, son of James Bynum. The land being sold may have included part of the original 1681 patent to John Bynum Sr., inherited by Robert Webb from his father.

Elizabeth4 (William Ligon3, Samuel2, Thomas1) was b. c1796, VA; d. 8 Aug 1861, Coles Co., IL, bur. Dry Grove Cemetery, near Mattoon, Coles Co., IL; m. John Gannaway, prob in Grayson Co., KY in the early 1820's. In 1830, the Gannaways lived in Clark Co., IL as 2002001-2121001. In 1850, the couple lived in Coles Co., IL, where John was a farmer. He was the son of Gregory and Rhode Robertson Gannaway, b. 15 Nov 1789, VA; d. 27 Feb 1875, Coles Co., IL; bur Dry Grove Cemetery. They may have had other children. Ages for daughters Elizabeth L. and Nancy D. are uncertain. Gravestone dates of birth don't fit the 1830 census data. Elizabeth was likely b. in the early 1820's and Nancy c1828. NOTE on October promotions at FTDNA...

HAPLOGROUP (SNP TEST) PROMOTION

I have also learned that Family Tree DNA is offering -- during October -- the SNP Test for HALF PRICE (\$50 instead of \$100). This is a perfect time to order this test if you want to confirm your haplogroup classification. If you are in a group, you can split this cost among the members -- for a group of 5, for example, everyone could toss in \$10. If you have done mtDNA and come up Helena ("H"), this is an ideal time to find out which of the newly identified H sub-clades you belong to.

The sub-clade test has already been ordered for the "I" group which includes Jesse Levy Webb.

Now for the bad news...for R1b folks. The short version is that you are almost certainly R1b3 -- most Western European descent R1bs are, and testing for further sub-clades is effective only for about 20% of R1b3s. Therefore, ordering the test is somewhat of a gamble on belonging to that 20%. For R1b groups, this may be a good time to take that gamble. If you don't have any matches, and therefore nobody to share the cost with, you may not wish to take that gamble. Or you may wish to go ahead while it's half price. Work IS being done on trying to identify more of the R1b sub-clade SNPs and you may wish to wait until more have been identified.

PROPOSALS: We have two expansions of the project under proposal.

1) A CD which will include our newsletter archives and an index, a general history/summary of the project similar to the information on the public pages, and whatever additional information participants VOLUNTEER to include. Nobody's detailed lineage will be included unless they request that it be included. We will of course, include a link to the Project website, and perhaps to the links of WEBB websites. Again, if you don't wish your website included, just say so and it won't be.

The idea here is to make the CD available to genealogical libraries and societies who might not be online. This is an attempt to reach WEBB researchers who might not be aware of the DNA Project because they aren't online. Feedback on this is desired.

2) An added section to the public area website dealing with the historically documented lineages. This would be the early generations of lines some of us hope to connect with (Richard Webb of CT, William Micajah, etc). While daughters will be mentioned, the emphasis will be on sons. We will post DOCUMENTED information here, not what has been conjectured in a book or on a website. Again, nobody's detailed lineages will be posted here. If DNA evidence of the line is available we will say so (results won't be posted, just a simple statement that we have DNA documentation for this line). This is designed to encourage researchers who might think (or know) they are connected to these lines to join the Project. We will also state -- for appropriate lines -- that we have participants who believe they are connected and we are looking for DOCUMENTED descendants to participate. Feedback on this proposal is also desired.

STATUS: 68 Y-DNA samples (oops 69 one new FTDNA order since I started!)
2 mtDNA samples (one of which is enrolled in another surname project)
FTDNA shows 66 members with 58 kits returned. Of those, we have

NEW FTDNA TOOL: FTDNATiP

Family Tree DNA has developed a new tool for calculating time to common ancestor that is available to the Group Administrator. This just became available in the past few days, and I have been working with it. I have also been reading the heavy emails about this tool on the DNA mailing list. I have done some calculations for some of you, and before the rest of you email me and ask me to run calculations for all of you, let me advise you that it appears to have some bugs in it. When I am satisfied these have been worked out, I plan to run the calculations for all the WEBBs.

I will give you an illustrative example from my own family:

Kits 5667 and 13791 are a father-son pair. When I put them into the calculator, the results, based on 25 markers and generations of 25 years, it says the probability they share a common ancestor within the last 100 years is 61.17%, which is certainly reassuring. Within 200 years is 84.92%, within 300 years is 94.15%, within 400 years is 97.73%, 500 years is 99.12% and 600 years is 99.66%.

These two men descend from George Washington Webb (b 1824), brother to William Henry Webb (b 1829) (my gggrandfather). These men are sons of Elias Webb (1785-1850/60) We also have a sample from my second cousin -- and the numbers are the same. The common ancestor is within 200 years. 5975 is my cousin and theirs -- here's the tree:

At present, the tool does not allow for entry of a number of known generations without a common ancestor for an exact match. I have asked FTDNA about this, since we have several exact matches whose connections aren't known (14215 and 8283 for example).

I ran this latter pair of kits through the FTDNATiP and obtained the following probabilities:

Common Ancestor within last 100 years	83.49%
200 years	97.28%
300 years	99.55%
400 years	99.93%
500 years	99.99%
600 years	100.00%

I cannot enter values from DNAH kits -- so please don't ask. Nor can I enter values from other surnames -- which in some cases might be useful. Also, many people argue that the 25 year generations are too "short" and that 30 is more reasonable. You can manually adjust this by multiplying the number of years by 30/25 or 1.2, if you feel 30 years is more appropriate for your family tree.

STORIES FROM OUR PARTICIPANTS

"...I was looking through my gg.grandmother Webb's bible years ago, and found an obit from Feb.5 1890 Texas Baptist and Herald for Thomas Augustine Webb. I have assumed he is very distantly kin but have never found a connection.

In any case, have wondered if the info would help someone's research. From obit- "Thomas Augustine Webb came of an old English stock of that name, three brothers of whom came to this country away back at the time of the colonies. One of the Webbs was a distinguished Baptist preacher in England, and the family partook in England of the clear cut quality of the French Huguenots. The three brothers who came to the United States scattered into various portions of the country; one settling in the North, one in Maryland, and one in South Carolina. One of the descendants of this last moved to the State of Virginia where, in Orange County, on the 7th day of April, was born Thomas Augustine Webb".

It goes on to say that the family moved to Lafayette Co. Missouri where he grew up and joined the Baptist Church in Dover at the age of 18. (baptized by Rev. W.H. Ligan) Was ordained a deacon in 1860. Doesn't list his father's name , but does say "he was a man of ample fortune, being a large slave owner"

Thomas Webb married Miss Elizabeth Buford,a cousin of Gen. Buford. 4 daughters, 1 son, all died in childhood. Webb fought in Civil War as Captain in Grave's Brigade in Price's Army. After war moved to Lexington for 5 years. Wife died and he married Miss Margaret Prather, daughter of Phillip Prather in Lafayette Co., Mo. She died in Dallas Tx in 1878. Then married Mrs. Sallie Robinett of Jefferson, who had been acquaintances and intimate friends in their youth.

Brother not named but- "he had six brothers and three sisters. One brother died in prison during the war. The rest survive him and all except one are members of Baptist Churches. (The heathen!! :-) His three sisters all married Baptist Ministers. One the wife of Rev. Chas. Whiting lives in Canton, Ill.; One married Rev. Edward of Lafayette Co., Mo., and another married Rev. Whiting of Higginsville, Mo. His father and mother were baptists, the first dying in 1855, the latter in 1865." (not named)

The obit also mentions a friend Rev. John Holland who lived near him, who Thomas Webb summoned to be with him when he died. His remains were buried in the City cemetery, and services were conducted by Wm. Howard. Brother Holland related the happy scenes of the last hours (happy?:-)

It is really long but those are the people mentioned in it. I thought the mention of descending from the three brother and places might be of some interest to someone.

The Originall Adventurers for the Plantacon of the Somers IslandsThe names of the originall adventurers for the plantacon of the Somers Islands taken out of the Letters Patents of King James of blessed memorie. In the twelfth yeare of His Reigne over England &c and of Scotland the eight and ffortieth (1615)Bermuda, once called the Somer's Islands after Lord Somers who first shipwrecked on the islands in 1609, was claimed by the Virginia Company.
