I'm going to start this tree with the most contemporaneously famous member -- James Edwin Webb, Sr., NASA Administrator, 02/14/1961-10/07/1968.

John Frederick Webb (03/27/1873, near Stern in Tally Ho Twnship, Granville Co, NC-12/04/1958) m Sarah Edwin Gorham (1882, Battleboro, NC - ) Educated in private schools. Graduated U of NC - Chapel Hill 1898. 2 uncles who started their own school. Supt of Granville co, Schools 1907 - July, 1935.\*2

Supt of schools in Granville Co. for 26 years.

Exec Asst to Under Secretary of the Treasury O Max Gardner. Dir, Bureau of the Budget, Exec Office of the President, until 1949. Apptd by Truman to Under Secretary of State, US Dept of State where Webb served until 1953. Kerr-McGee Oil corp, OKC, OK. NASA Administrator 1961 - 1968. After retiring, he remained in DC, serving on advisory boards, including that of the Smithsonian. Buried Arlington National Cemetary.\*1

**First Lieutenant Thomas Shappard Webb** : He was 81 years old on 26 September 1921, and was born in Haywood County, Tennessee. At the outbreak of the war he was a student at the University of North Carolina; his father was a cotton merchant and partner in the trading firm of Webb & Rawlings. He entered Confederate service in

Shelby County, Tennessee. His parents owned many slaves before moving to Memphis in 1846, only about 25 slaves afterwards; they owned a seven room frame house on Union Street in Memphis, kept about 10 slaves at home and hired out the rest. Thomas was very well educated, attending private schools until the Memphis city schools were established, then went to the Bingham School in Alamance County, North Carolina before entering the University of North Carolina. He was a Junior when the war broke out. He joined in April 1861 at Memphis, Tennessee to Captain Jas. Moreland's Company (G), 'the Beauregards', Colonel Preston Smiths' (154th) Regiment Tennessee Infantry; served with his brothers Jno. Lewis Webb and Jas. A. Webb (killed at Murfreesboro). He fought at the Battle of Belmont, at Shiloh and Corinth; the day before the evacuation of Corinth he was captured by an Indiana brigade and sent as a prisoner to Camp Chase and then to Johnson's Island; was exchanged at Vicksburg, Mississippi. He was transferred to Forest's Cavalry and was wounded at Tishomingo Creek, Mississippi; was on crutches for a year. He was in Forests last fight near Scottsville, Alabama and was exchanged at Gainesville after the surrender. His father was Jas. Lewis Webb born in **Tally Ho**, Granville County, North Carolina; he died 2 February 1860; he married Ariana Shapard 8 April 1834. His grandfather was **James Webb**, married to Ann Hunt Smith and James was the son of John Webb and Amy Booker. He had three brothers in the war, Jas. A. was killed at Missionary Ridge, Wm. B. was mortally wounded in Mississippi, Jno. L. was wounded yet lived. Thomas received a license to practice law in 1867 and has done so ever since; moved to Knoxville in 1869. of

## **The Story of GOvernors Island Headquarters of U.S. First Army Ch. 6 The Civil War**

Captured Confederate officers and men were held in Castle Williams which was used as a prison during the war. Frequently as many as 1500 prisoners were kept there at one time.

The escape of one of these prisoners, Captain **William Webb** of the 2d North Carolina Cavalry, provides one of the Island's most unusual adventure stories. In April 1865 Captain Webb climbed over the walls of the stockade where he had been a prisoner for less than a day and slipped into the Bay without being discovered. He was a powerful swimmer and managed to reach the Battery where a passerby helped him to climb to shore. When he was asked about his identity, Webb frankly replied that he was a Southern prisoner escaping from Governors Island. The story seemed like a joke to questioners and although many people who saw Webb were curious about his

Confederate uniform, no one took him seriously. At the close of the war, he was still wandering at liberty in New York.

### **Excerpts from William Perrin's "History of Bourbon, Scott, Harrison & Nicholas Counties" Chapters IX-XII**

*C H A P T E R X--CITY OF PARIS--EARLY PERIOD OF THE TOWN--ITS GROWTH--PIONEER POLITICS--IMPROVEMENTS OF THE CITY--WAR EXCITEMENT AND SOLDIERS--TRANSIENT PROSPERITY--BURNING OF THE COURTHOUSE--CENTRAL UNIVERSITY--TEMPERANCE MOVEMENT--CHOLERA, ETC., ETC.*

MR. James H. McCann, Who is now living, has a very distinct recollection of Paris as far back as 1805. There were, at that time, seventy-five or eighty buildings, situated mostly in the lower part of the town. From the best information that can be obtained, it is probable the first house built in Paris was the old log house on the northwest corner of High and Church streets, which was torn down last year. Some of these buildings are yet standing, among which are the old Burr House, now occupied by Mrs. Webb as it boarding-house, which was then a tavern, owned and kept by Mrs. James Duncan;

Presbyterian Church...1881(?) William Webb Assistant Librarian of the Sunday School.

The following sketch of the early history of the Christian Church was written by Elder John A. Gano: "At the request of several brethren, members of the church in Paris, Ky., I write the following brief history of that church, in its origin, infancy and progress. For many years Elders Stone, Purviance, Dooley and others, in their itinerations, preached much in Bourbon County. The churches at Mount Carmel, Millersburg and Flat Run, at in early period, under their labors came into existence, nor should I fail to mention the efficient labors of those faithful ministers, Francis R. Palmer, Thomas Smith, Joel Haden and others, who, during the first quarter of the present century, throughout a considerable portion of Northern Kentucky, preached without any earthly compensation. Paris often shared in the benefit of these labors. It was not, however, until in September, 1827, when I came with Brother Thomas M. Allen to Paris to hold a meeting, that any encouraging movement toward the formation of a church took place. During that meeting he immersed Mrs. George W. Williams, and her mother, Mrs. Mary T. Webb. . Later in the autumn of the same year, we held another meeting. Through the kindness of the magistracy we were permitted the use of that time-honored, grand old court house, all the meeting-houses in town being closed against us, until the good Baptist, Brother William Bryan, offered us the use of their house. As some of the members of his church objected, we preferred to use the court room and it was here, at this second meeting in the autumn of 1827, an effort was made to gather a church. On invitation several came forward to have their names enrolled, viz.: Mrs. Mary T. Webb, Mrs. George W. Williams, Mrs. H. Wilson, Mrs. M. Ashford, Miss M. Speak, and, perhaps, another.

The Rescue Fire Company was organized March 16, 1874. The city furnished the company with a splendid handbrake engine and four-wheeled hose carriage, and afterward purchased of the Ahrens Manufacturing Co. of Cincinnati, Ohio, a No. 4 steam fire engine, which was given the name of R. W. O'Connor, and a two-wbeeled hose carriage, calling it O. A. Gilman. Afterward, a hook and ladder truck was bought for the use of the company, which they named the Ever Ready. The company has rendered invaluable services to the people of our city, and is one of the beat inland fire organizations in the State. The following-named. members are its present officers : R. W. O'Connor, President; Nich. Kreiner, V. P.; A. J. Lovely, Secretary; J. T. Doyle, Treasurer; J. A. Stewart, First Chief; Nich. Kreiner, Assistant Chief; William Mitchell, First Engine Director; W. F. Ficklin, Second Engine Director; O. N. Fithian, First Line Director; E. B. January, Second Line Director; Frank Webb

#### 1998 BENJAMIN AUXIER

Benjamin Harrison Auxier Jr., age 72, of Stanford, Kentucky died Tuesday, December 15, 1998, at Central Baptist Hospital in Lexington, Kentucky. He was a self-employed piano and organ technician and a gunsmith. He was a member of the Danville Presbyterian Church.
