 mtDNA match! 30263 matched 9975, as expected. Oddly, the results were reported as different in one respect. 9975 has deletions at 523 and 524, while 30263 showed deletions at 522 and 523. I am told by the experts, however, that these two pairs of deletions are the same. Please don't ask me to explain it yet, as I am still learning why that is so. When I understand it, I will explain it.

Many of you have probably seen the news announcements of this joint project of Spencer Wells, the National Geographic Society, IBM and Family Tree to collect worldwide samples of DNA and fund with the sale of \$99.95 kits here. Some of you have asked questions.

If you have tested already with Family Tree DNA, you will be able to upload your results to this project "for a nominal fee," although I have no information as yet regarding the dollar amount of that fee. You will not learn anything new about Y-DNA than you know from the test you have already had done, although some of the accompanying materials maybe interesting. I do NOT know yet if you will be able to order those materials "at a nominal fee."

mtDNA is another issue. As I currently understand it, the \$99.95 test for mtDNA will be the Low Resolution test, so if you have NOT tested for mtDNA and wish to, this is a great opportunity to do so. This price is **greatly reduced from the group one**. If you have tested Y-DNA, please note that this price is LOWER than the mtDNA add on.

Participants in this ground-breaking study WILL have the opportunity/choice to register their data with our surname project. So this might ALSO be a good opportunity to recruit new members. They will have the opportunity not only to get in being part of this ground-breaking and historical project, but to get into our Project.

BIOTIX Batch

I am preparing another BIOTIX order which I expect to ship to them around the end of May. If you are interested in placing an order, please contact me. If I can get 100 orders, there is a 50% discount. For 10+ WEBBs, we get a 5%

discount. I am taking orders from other Projects, so don't think I am looking for 100 WEBBs to place orders. I'm simply offering the opportunity to you. I don't get a commission or anything -- I'm doing this because it's less expensive than ordering these markers from DNAH, since we only have to order what we want, not a minimum of 23 markers. Also, it allows DNAH customers to "fill in the holes" where they do not have markers to compare to FTDNA participants without having to buy the FTDNA 37 kit.

If you tested at DNAH ONLY, you might wish to order DYS570 & DYS576, which DNAH does not offer. The cost of this, BEFORE discounts, is about \$86. If I succeed in getting 100 orders, this will be approximately \$43, maybe a little less. The major part of this expense is the Isolation (first step in any DNA Analysis). Once this is done, however, additional markers are quite inexpensive.

If you have not ordered the new DYS643 or the 385(K) test, you may wish to order these.

If you have been tested at FTDNA ONLY, you may wish to order DYS461, DYS463, & GATA C4.

Earliest references I have to WEBBs in Chowan are John in 1723 & Richard (of Nansemond Co, VA) in 1725, however, it is unclear whether either are resident, and I need to find the source of the 1723 John Webb notation -- I think it might be a Cross Ref to NC Grants *& Deeds. John would have to have been born NLT 1702, and Richard NLT 1704.

Earliest land grant was 270 acres on the NW side of **Bennett's Creek** in 1711.

GRANBERRY Family: On 30 April 1679 William bought 85 acres at the head of Mr. **Bennett's Creek** in Nansemond County, VA. (VA Land Office Patent Book, 6-6)

from "Journal or Historical Account of the Life, Travels,

Sufferings, Christian Experiences....of George Fox" published in 1832 in Philadelphia, containing a lengthy preface by William Penn. Fox was a prolific and remarkable writer, and his Journal was first published in England in 1694.

>From the account of his travels, much may be gleaned of conditions then current. Reference to "Sommertown" indicates that his course on horseback from "Nancemun" (Nansemond) was along one of the trails west of the Great Dismal to the present Somerton; and that a day's travel "over many bogs and swamps"

brought him to "Bonner's Creek (**Bennett's Creek**) where the horses were left, the first house in Carolina. Apparently other families lived in the vicinity

of Hugh Smith's since a meeting was convened. That they were not Quakers, however, indicates a hunger of those pioneers of the forests for contact with

the outside world; also a dearth of any sort of religious influence in those parts. Captain Nathaniel Batts was a legendary character of early Albemarle

of whom little of fact is recorded. Apparently he was an early hunter and trapper who became a leader among the Indians, which may explain the reference

of his having been "governor of Roan-oak". He held no such office under the Proprietary government. The "river Maratick" was the Chowan, as it was shown

P 641 "The Vanns, Rogers, and Langston's according to old records lived near SARAM CHAPEL, an old landmark in what is now Gates County, which was at the head of SARAM CREEK in the **BENNETT'S CREEK** section. There were two Indian towns not far from this same settlement. One of these was near the mouth of Meherrin River which was occupied by the Meherrin Indians. In fact, Indians were all around them at that period and it was much later when the Indian lands were laid out lower down on the Morratuck or Roanoke, in the bounds of present Bertie County. TOPIC OF INTEREST (Technical) Deletions on the Y-Chromosome During the Copy Process

When I explained the DNA process to many of you, I told you that we would not be looking at the portion of DNA which contains your medical information, the color of your hair or eyes, etc. I was giving you the best information science at the time. Now, an unexpected discovery makes that "not quite true."

A recent article has appeared in the journals which indicates that deletions in the AZFc region -- estimated at about 1 in 4000 men -- are linked to infertility. [None of our participants have this deletion.] In this region lie the 464a/b/c/d markers.

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Ann Turner's explanation:

King et al were conducting a surname study with Y chromosome markers, and found three cases in unrelated males where the SNP marker P25 (for R1b) could not be amplified. When they examined those cases, they found that all of them had the AZFc deletion. Their sample size was 2574 men, and they pooled their data with 681 other records that had been typed for P25 (called PN25 in the

article). This gives a rate of 3 in 3255, not significantly different than previous estimates.

This particular AZFc deletion occurs at a "hot spot." The Y chromosome has many duplicated segments. It can bend and fold on itself during the copy process, becoming attached at a "homologous" (similar) stretch of DNA. If you follow the animation, I picture the DNA copying enzymes taking a short-cut across the base of a loop, "forgetting" to copy the 3 million bases in the loop.

Side note: I got to wondering if recombination might explain the variable behavior of the CDY marker. The details about that marker have not been published yet, but I do see a CDY marker in the AZFc region in Jobling's diagram from "The Human Y Chromosome: An Evolutionary Marker Comes of Age": <http://www.le.ac.uk/genetics/maj4/JoblingTS.03.NRG.Review.pdf>

This same region also contains the DYS464 multi-copy markers. If someone has the AZFc deletion, he will end up with a "null" result. The authors conclude "There certainly seems no good reason for continued commercial typing of the AZFc marker DYS464, which in any case offers problems of interpretation because of its multilocal nature." [End of Ann Turner's explanation]

None of the commercial labs have yet indicated that they are planning to drop DYS464. Given that this event is rare, and the series sometimes proves to be a "sorting" marker within groups of related people, I am not sure what they will decide to do. However, I felt I should advise you of this potential outcome. I am of the opinion that most of our participants are past the age at which this revelation would be a shock (i.e., they already know or have a good idea of whether they are fertile or not), and I plan to offer any participant who wishes it the choice to indicate this marker set as "unreported." Feedback and comments are welcome.

She married **JOHN WEBB**, another child of the Webb family who came from Jefferson County, Tennessee with the Banksons. Susannah and John are listed in the Alabama Census of 1830 in St. Clair County. (Cherokee was part of St. Clair County, in 1830). **John Webb** died 28 Jan 1899 Cherokee County, Alabama, and Susannah died only six days later, on 3 Feb 1899. They had the following children:

Additional: Bayou Scie Methodist Church was founded in 1834. It is one of the oldest churches in the area. Samuel **WEBB**, a Circuit Rider, was the first Pastor for the church, their were nine charter members that met in the split log building. The present building was built in 1885. Samuel **WEBB** was born on October 10, 1815 and died on February 05, 1867. He and his wife Elizabeth WILEY had 12 Children.

Three other men served as Circuit Riding Prechers for the church before Samuel **WEBB**. They were: William STEPHENSON in 1827, Preston COOPER in 1832 and James P. STEPHENSON in 1833.

CONTEXT

Administrative/Biographical history: The manor of Wentsland and Bryngwyn is listed in the Valor Ecclesiasticus of 1535 as one of the possessions of the monastery of Llantarnam in Monmouthshire. In 1539 Henry VIII granted all the lands of the former monastery of Llantarnam to John Parker, one of the esquires of the king's stables. By 1552, John Parker had assigned the monastic lands to Walter ap Jenkin. In 1560 Elizabeth I granted the possessions of the monastery, and the lordships of Neath Ultra and Neath Citra, to William Herbert, earl of Pembroke, for £3199. The following year the earl received licence to alienate the manor of Wentsland and Bryngwyn to William Morgan (d. 1582) of Llantarnam, MP for Monmouthshire 1555-1571. William Morgan was succeeded by his only son and heir Edward Morgan (c. 1550-1633), MP for Monmouthshire 1586, who was succeeded by his son William Morgan, who also died 1633. His son Edward Morgan (d. 1653) was created a baronet in 1642, and is probably the Sir Edward Morgan who was MP for Monmouthshire 1614-1622. His estate was sequestered in 1651, he being a Catholic and a royalist, when the estate was worth £886 a year, of which Wentsland and Bryngwyn returned £55 a year. In 1654, Sir Edward Morgan, 2nd baronet, petitioned under the Recusants' Act of 1653 for the return of two parts of his estate, which had been sequestered for his recusancy only. On the death of Sir Edward Morgan 3rd baronet, in 1682, the estates were divided between his two infant daughters, as tenants in common of Edeligion, Pwll-pen, Magna Porta, and Wentsland and Bryngwyn. Ann Morgan (d. 1712) never married, while her sister Frances married Edmund Bray of Barrington, Gloucestershire, MP. The estates were partitioned in 1707, with the manors of Edeligion and Pwll-pen allotted to Ann Morgan, and Magna Porta and Wentsland and Bryngwyn allotted to Frances Bray. Frances Bray settled her manors in 1707 on her sons and daughters. Only two daughters left issue, Mary the wife of John Blewitt of London, and Frances (d. 1764) the wife of Thomas Fettiplace (formerly Bushell) of Swinbrook, Oxfordshire. Thomas and Frances Fettiplace were succeeded by their three daughters and coheirs, Frances, wife of Richard Gorges of Eye, Herefordshire, MP for Leominster 1754-1761, Mary (dsp?), successively wife of Blandy Shaw and George Kemeys of Maendy, **Glamorgan**, and Arabella, wife of John **Webb** of Cote, Gloucestershire, MP for Gloucester 1780-1795. A private Act of Parliament of 1810 partitioned Frances Bray's estates and manors. The manor of Magna Porta and the mansion house of Llantarnam were to pass to Mary Blewitt's heirs. This estate descended to Reginald James Blewitt, whose trustees sold the estate in about 1888. By the 1810 Act, the manor of Wentsland and Bryngwyn was to pass to the heirs of Frances Fettiplace, with a moiety each passing to the heirs of Frances Gorges and Arabella **Webb**. One fifth of a moiety of the manor of Wentsland and Bryngwyn passed to each of the five surviving daughters of Frances Gorges, that is Diana Frances Gorges (d. unmarried), Elizabeth (d. 1829) wife of Charles Henry Sheldon of Haute Fontaine, France (her second husband), Arabella (d. 1839) wife of John Gwynne (d. 1852), Meliora (d. 1843) wife of Deliverance Dacre, and Mary wife of Thynne Howe Gwynne of Buckland, Brecknockshire (his second wife). John and Frances **Webb's** (only?) son, Edward **Webb** (d. c. 1839), had a daughter Elizabeth Frances **Webb**, who died unmarried in 1877. A. N. Middleton of Newark came forward in 1864, claiming to be the son of Mary, the disowned daughter of the Rev Thomas **Webb**, a supposed brother of Benjamin **Webb**. Mary Gwynne's share was sold in 1871 to the Ebbw Vale Steel, Iron & Coal Company.
