Now that the project is growing so large, and there are so many Bills, Johns, Richards and other first names among you, I am having a difficult time remembering your lines, kit #s, etc. When you write about any kit -- your own or one you are interested in -- please please help me out by giving the kit #(s) in which you are interested. This is especially true for those researchers who are the Official contact for the kit.

If you refer to "John Webb who married...." or "James and So-and-so and such-and-such," please remember that wives are not listed in the abbreviated lineage, so I can't search on their names. The preferred reference is (Name of oldest ancestor in the line, DOB, POB - DOD, POD) as shown in the lineage.

3. The Scholarship Fund has recently had a boost. Part of this comes from a participant backing out after the kit had been paid for. Part of it comes from the donation of the price of a kit ordered & paid for long ago which was never used. Part of it comes from recent donations. Therefore, we are blessed with a fat kitty at the moment. However, this has prompted a change in our policy regarding scholarship funds.

Henceforth, all potential scholarship recipients MUST pay part of their kit up front. Upon reflection and discussion among myself and the co-administrator and several of you, we feel that the payment of part of the kit, even if only \$5 or \$10 up front, before the kit is ordered, makes a commitment which is less likely to be reneged upon. These potential participants may make their payment to the Scholarship Fund. No authorization for Scholarship Funds will be placed, however, until such payment is received and posted. There are too many people waiting for assistance to tie funds up for weeks in kits from people who aren't really committed to the project.

4. The website is undergoing a major rework. There are two reasons for this. First, the growth of the Project necessitates a second page of results. Therefore, we are splitting the DNA results into one page for R1b and one page for all other haplogroups. The second is that the new format will make maintenance easier. I know we all appreciate Mark's work on the website and understand that anything that makes his work for us easier is worth a slight delay in posting of results right now.

Article of Interest (Technical) DYS464 Test from Biotix -- Reporting of results

You will soon notice that there are some changes in the reporting of some R1b DYS464 results. This is due to the purchase by several participants of the new Biotix DYS464X test. You will see underneath each value either (c) or (g). This test is for R1b only, as they have 3 "c" type alleles and one "g" type. The other haplogroups have 4 "c" types. The value of this test is that a group of WEBBs with mutations in the 464 series can tell whether the mutation is on the "g" type. This should help groups with a lot of variation in this marker sort out sub-lineages. We will be posting the "g" as 464d on the website -- and the three "c" types will be listed in increasing numerical order. If you have mutations from the rest of your group, or if your results show a pattern of x,x,y,y, or x,y,y,z, AND you are R1b, I recommend that you have the 464X test done to determine whether you have 2,3, or 4 alleles. If someone in your group has had the test, you may also wish to have this test done.

Example (not real data):

- surname A, 1: 15c, 15c, 16g, 17c
- surname A, 2: 15c, 15c, 16g, 17c
- surname A, 3: 15c, 15c, 16c, 17g
- surname B, 1: 15c, 15c, 16g, 18c
- surname C, 1: 15c, 15c, 15g, 17c

A1 & A2 have an exact match on DYS464. A3 has at least two mismatches from the first two (genetic distance 2). B1 & C1 each have a genetic distance of 1, B1 by a mutation on one of the "c" types from "17" to "18" and C1 by a 2-step "back mutation" of the "g" type from "17" to "15."

Biotix has also discovered a marker alongside DYS464 known now as DYS725, which is also a 4 allele marker. While the value of this marker has yet to be fully explored, one value lies in its ability to tell whether DYS464 values reported as "double repeats" (such as 15,15,17,17) are truly 4 copies or just 2. When the DYS464 is processed by the testing providers, under current processing, the electropherogram will show two peaks. The presence of two copies with the same value is inferred by the height of the peaks, and usually it is assumed that there are 4 copies. Recent research, however, has suggested this is not always the case. Part of the DNA can be deleted during replication in the area in which DYS464 is located (see prior Newsletter for discussion of this), leaving fewer than 4 copies at DYS464. If DYS464 and DYS725 both show reduction, this indicates that such deletion has occurred. Normal mutations will have different results at DYS464 and DYS725. Testing for this deletion, however, will need at least two members of the same group to take the test for comparison.

NOTE: COMPLETE deletion of the 464 series has been associated with male infertility.

My special thanks to my cousin Frank Parker Hudson for his generosity in sharing his 30+ years of research into our WEBB family & his research expertise. Thanks also to the many cousins and suspected cousins who have contributed to this account. This is an expansion of the January 2004 Newsletter piece.

These families are believed to be related to one another. My current working theory is that Stephen and Rice are the sons of a William or Micajah or William Micajah Webb. Both Rice and Stephen Webb are Revolutionary War Soldiers from North Carolina.

Q: Why did neither obtain bounty land in GA? Both appear to have bought their land in GA from some other grantee. One possibility is that they claimed bounty land in what is now TN or elsewhere -- records of Washington County, NC (TN) might be in order.

NOTE: There are only two references to "Bud Creek" It appears that this might refer to the same creek as "red Bud Creek." Land transactions for Stephen Webb also mention PeachTree Creek and James Boon, Lewis Webb, Jesse Webb and John Webb are witnesses for his transactions, one of which is a sale to Jeremiah Culpepper.

NOTE: This Micajah Webb would have to have been born NLT 1776.

This is too far from the VA border to be referring to the Micajah Webb in Brunswick/Greenville, VA -- unless he owned land in NC as well.

Stephen signs the petition to create Nash from Edgecombe in 1777. Ann appears as Stephen's wife in a deed in 1782/3. Stephen & Ann are believed to be the Stephen and Ann found in Edgecombe & Nash, NC until 1796, when they seem to be selling out. In 1797, a wagon train from that area reached E. GA. Rice and Polley are believed to have been in Franklin Co, NC in 1790, then in Jefferson Co, GA and in Henry Co, AL by 1830. In Franklin Co, we find this:

***Charles Yarbrough Jun Ct. 1813 Inventory taken by James Yarbrough
 excr...Included were notes on Rice Webb, William Webb, Micajah Webb.***

[unfortunately we have only the note about the notes on Rice, William & Micajah, not the notes themselves!]

NOTE: Somewhere on the web I have seen a reference to "yarbrough - webb-?-?" family records. I thought I book marked it but apparently I didn't I THINK it was a VGS newsletter.

- DNA GOALS:
1. mtDNA from a female lineal descendant of Ann Webb (candidate located)
 2. mtDNA from a female lineal descendant of May Webb (candidates available but not yet located)
 3. mtDNA from a matrilineal descendant of Sealy Webb, believed to be the sister of Elias Webb, who married Jesse MAYNOR, the brother of Elias's wife. (candidate probably located)
 4. Y-DNA from the Jesse Webb line (donor located; kit ordered)

Comparisons to be made: #3 should match #1 or #2, which will suggest which of #1 or #2 is Sealy's mother. This should add evidence to the question of who Elias's father is. #4 should be close to Elias Webb (Richard Webb of CT Group)

Jesse is possibly Stephen's son, or Rice's son. One source has said he was the son of "James Webb." Another says "Ricey." Current theory is that Jesse is Stephen's son. The main evidence for this is Peletitha Culpepper's will refers to Samuel Bozeman as "nephew," the fact that Stephen Webb is paying taxes in 1799 on land "granted to L. Bozeman" and Jesse marries Nancy Bozeman, and the fact that William Smarr, Stephen's son-in-law proves Stephen's will in Jefferson Co, GA -- at a time Jesse Webb has left the county but Elias Webb is still there, and of age. Seems as if Stephen's adult son were present, he would have served in this capacity instead of Stephen's son-in-law. This is also part of the reason I believe Elias was Rice's son, along with no evidence that Elias ever received any of Stephen's land, and the naming of Elias's eldest son as Britian Rice. Finally, when Elias first appears on the tax rolls in 1806, his land is "adj. R. Webb." Rice Webb bought, in 1798 100 A on Lambert's Creek - an eastern tributary of the Ogeechee, land which was once in Burke County and possibly in Warren Co before 1796. This land therefore would have been close to the Maynors in Burke County -- not unnaturally leading the marriage of brother and sister Jesse and Mary Ann "Nancy" Maynor to brother and sister Elias and Sealy Webb.

In 1802, Stephen Webb, Jesse Webb & Sion Webb petition for a road to Shelman's Shelman's Bridge on Ogeechee. Jo Smith Webb's book Linkage mentions a Sion Webb as a son of Isaac and Frances Barber Webb, who according to Smith's History of Georgia received a Solider of the Line Bounty Grant (p 269) Jo Smith Webb also lists a Sion Webb on hr page 79, but seems to indicate he is a son of Rachel Giles and John Webb. These are the only references to Sion Webb I find. In any case, Sion disappears.

Jefferson CO, GA marriages: MUST be the daughters of Stephen, Rice, or Jesse as no other WEBBs are in the county.

DNA Trivia Question Answer (NOBODY submitted a guess)

The first non-Caucasian US President appears to have been Thomas Jefferson. Spencer Wells recently announced that Jefferson's Y-DNA had been SNP tested and he belongs to K2. This is very rare in northern Europe -- Capelli surveyed 1772 British men and found only one K2 man. This haplogroup is found in one study to be 7.2% of Iraqis. The other place K2 reaches this level of concentration is Ethiopia -- another person in Wells' film that was K2 was an Ethiopian prince, several mutations away from Jefferson.. Otherwise K2 is at low levels scattered across several continents. Wells plans to look for a source population for K2 as part of a broad survey of Y-DNA in the Middle East and North Africa and to have a publication by the end of the year.

K2 may be a back migration from Asia into Africa. It is found in larger concentrations in Egypt, Oman, Tanzania, Ethiopia and Morocco, and highest in the Fulbe (18%). K2 is 10% of the Somali men. It has also been found in Turkey (Anatolia). K2 was also found in selected populations in Spain -- 4.5% of Seville & Huelva, 10.7% of Cadiz, 0.9% of Northern Portugal, 4.3% of Cantabria, and 3.2% of Valencia. James Kelly permitted Wash to retain half of the money he earned as a cab driver in Mobile. Wash funneled his earnings to **John Webb**, who apparently had agreed to help the slave purchase his freedom. A sale was executed, but Kelly sued Webb after learning he had been defrauded. Judge Stone ruled in Kelly's favor. Whatever property a slave accrued belonged to the master (1 Stewart 320 and 20 Alabama 488). If a slave acquired property with his master's consent and transferred it likewise, the master could not recover (9 Alabama 271 and 28 Alabama 514). But in this case the person who received the property did not receive it in his own right, but as a "custodian for the benefit of the slave." The purchase had been made with money furnished by Wash without Kelly's permission. *Webb v Kelly*, 37 Alabama 333 (1861).
