*******SPECIAL ANNOUNCEMENT*******

As many of you know, I live in Houston, where some 1/4 of a million evacuees from Hurricane Katrina have come. Since before the hurricane hit, I have been working with individuals and organizations to do what I can to assist with the the short-term and long-term needs.

This tragic event has highlighted another need for documenting one's DNA -- for use in identification. With Katrina, this may be impossible for many victims because the exemplars (known DNA samples for comparison such as hairbrushes, toothbrushes, medical records, etc) have been washed away as well. There are "at home" DNA kits available, but in a tragedy such as this, they too would be washed away or blown away.

I would urge anyone in a hurricane, earthquake, tornado-prone area --- or anyone who flies often or lives in an area which might be targeted for a terror attack to make sure that there is a DNA sample stored with a company providing long term storage. Furthermore, the ideal firm for this would be one which also offers the ability to perform sibling tests and the more usual variety of paternity tests. Finally, make sure your relatives know that the sample is available and where it is available. Document it in your will, your medical records

If you have tested at FTDNA, your DNA is in storage. Ditto if you have tested at DNA-Fingerprint (BIOTIX). If you have tested at DNA, your DNA is NOT STORED.

Personally, I would recommend DNA-Fingerprint for this purpose. They fit the criterion of being able to do both genealogical testing and the more standard testing. Moreover, by providing a sample to DNA-Fingerprinting through the batch order process, this can be stored at a very reasonable price (around \$45 a person).

HINT OF THE MONTH: Trying to figure out who could give DNA for one of your ancestral lines? There's a nice interactive tool at AfricanAncestry where you can click on the ancestor whose DNA you want, and then you are asked a series of questions which guides you to the current living relative you need to find for the DNA you wish to have.

If you want your mother's mother's father's DNA - check his surname project to see if that line has been documented. Any male line in your heritage can be sought this way. mtDNA is trickier, because not all projects accept or track female DNA, so even if someone has done say your greatgreatgreatgreatgrandmother's known sister, you may not be able to locate the mtDNA. There may some day be a database that identifies customers by the women along the line. There is certainly a lot of discussion about this.

Personally, if you have a female line which tracks back to VA or NC prior to 1850, I am starting to collect some mtDNA data in these areas (regardless of surnames). I require the entire known female lineage using MAIDEN names, and high resolution results (low resolution are not useful for genealogy). Recent research indicates that mutations in mtDNA may be more rapid than previously believed, so look for possible developments in the use of mtDNA for genealogy.

ARTICLE: The Three John Webbs of Richmond Co, North Carolina, submitted by Bob Taylor

There are three John Webbs in early Richmond County, North Carolina records, namely, John Webb, Sr., who died in 1794, Turner John Webb, grandson of John Webb, Sr., and John Webb, a Quaker. John Webb, Sr., was the father of Robert, William, and Henly Webb. John Webb, Sr., was recorded in the 1790 tax assessment rolls with 40 acres of land and no poll, as he was over the age of 60. Turner John Webb was recorded in 1790 with 120 acres, and John Webb, Quaker was recorded with 100 acres and 1 poll. Robert Webb, son of John,

Sr., was listed as Esquire, with 92 acres and 1 poll. Also listed in 1790 was John Webb, Sr., son William, as well as George Webb and some of his sons, who were not related.

In the 1793 tax assessment rolls, John Webb, Sr., was again listed with 40 acres and no poll, Turner John Webb, 120 acres and 1 poll, and John Webb, Quaker, 100 acres and 1 poll. Since John Webb, Sr., died in 1794, he was not recorded in the 1795 tax assessment rolls of the county, but Turner John Webb was listed with 150 acres, and John Webb, Quaker, had 100 acres and 1 poll. Robert Webb, who had many dealings in land in the county, had 1,000 acres and 3 polls.

Census-wise, John Webb, Sr., was enumerated in the county in 1790 on page 178 as follows: 1 male over the age of 16, 2 males under the age of 16, and 1 female. Turner John Webb was listed as follows on page 171: 1 male over 16, 1 male under 16, and 1 female. John Webb, Quaker, was listed on page 172, 6 houses away from George Webb, as follows: 1 male over the age of 16, 2 males under the age of 16, and 2 females.

In 1800, there are still 3 John Webbs in the county, one of those most likely being a John Webb who married Nancy James in 1799 in Richmond County. The three listed in the 1800 census are Turner John on page 258, a John Webb, age 10 and under 16, listed by himself next to Watson Webb, who was enumerated as age 16 and under 26, with one male under the age of 10, and 1 female age 16 and under 26, both listed on page 264. (I believe these to be sons of John Webb, Quaker, who does not appear in 1800 or later Richmond county censuses) Also a John Webb on page 243, enumerated as follows: 1 male age 26 and under 45, 1 male age 10 and under 16, and 1 male age 16 and under 26, ?? females under the age of 10, 1 female age 10 and under 16, and one female age 26 and under 45. (I assume this could be the one who married Nancy James as a second wife)

Watson Webb is in the 1810 census of Richmond County with his wife and 3 males, and 2 females, and an older female over 45 years old, who could possibly be Watson's mother. Watson is also in the 1820 census on page 198, over 45 years old, with wife age 26 and under 45, 6 males and 3 females. In 1830 he is in neighboring Montgomery County east of the Pee Dee and Yadkin rivers, living two houses away from John Reynolds, who was the son of Henry Reynolds and Lucressy Webb, daughter of George Webb and Margaret Adcock. Henry Reynolds lived a few houses away. (Since this Watson Webb lived so close to my Webb line, I think he is the son of the John Webb in 1790 who lived 6 houses away from George Webb, but have yet to prove it or prove that he was or was not the half-brother of George Webb)

By 1840, Watson had died and his widow, Elizabeth Webb, was enumerated in Montgomery County as age 50 and under 60 with 2 males age 15 and under 20. (Montgomery County records are few and far between as there was a courthouse fire)

I note that a John Webb applied for a Revolutionary War pension in Maury County, Tennessee, stating that he enlisted at Rockingham Court House, Richmond County, and that he was about 80 years old in 1833. This would make him born about 1753, five years away from the documented date of 1748 for John Webb, half-brother of George Webb, son of Timothy Webb. He does not mention a wife or children in his application, but stated that he was a draftsman. (Quakers were not supposed to fight in wars, perhaps he joined on condition he was not to be put in the battlefield) I also note a Watson Webb or Watson Webb Managen, age 32, born in Tennessee, with wife and children in the 1860 census of Desha County, Arkansas.

TECHNICAL NOTES

25 marker matches, different surname

One of the DNA folks from another Project recently calculated that about 9% of the time a 23/25, 24/25 or 25/25 match with a different surname will go on to be significant at 37 markers. A rough estimate is that only about 30% of 11/12 or 12/12 matches go on to match at 23/25 or better. I am currently trying to develop some statistics on matches at 37 markers going on to match at 43 or more.

SMGF database (www.smgf.org)

For those of you who aren't familiar with this resource, Sorenson Molecular Genetic Foundation is a DNA research organization. They accept samples with pedigree charts for free. Participants do not receive results in return, and they may or may not ever post your results into their database. When they do, it might take two years. It can be an inexpensive way to test additional members of your family, if you can stand the wait. One of their research objectives is calculating the mutation rates within families -- so if you have 2-3-4-5 generations alive, and you send them all in -- or if you have several brothers and all of them (or all of them and their sons) send in samples and MARK THEM "This is one of x generations which will be sending in samples." or "This is one of y brothers who will be sending in samples," you may stand a better chance of being added to the database sooner. You MUST submit a GEDCOM -- but the names of all persons born after 1900 are hidden from public viewing.

You might ask "What good does that do if we can't get results back?" We can "mine" the database by entering our own values! One of our participants recently "mined" the database and discovered a related WEBB. He simply entered his own DNA values and looked for matches. The database will not give you a contact, but it may be possible to locate the donor, as our participant did, by entering the names on his tree into GOOGLE or other search engines or looking for them in Ancestry or on message boards. Even if you do not find the participant, if it enables us to add the lineage to our results sheet

Since his "mining" operation, SMGF has changed the search function. You may now enter your DNA AND a surname, and it will return only matches with that surname. Where there are mismatches, it's a trial & error process to find the allele for the marker.

There are TEN WEBBs in their database. I am able to retrieve 8 of the records, and SMGF informs me the other two do not have pedigrees with anyone born before 1900 -- which is too bad because those two could probably use OUR help! One of these is the one our participant mined earlier, and he has now joined the project. Please enter your DNA without the surname and let's see if we can find the 10th WEBB!

1. I have successfully identified one of the 8 as being a close match to 14416 and 23300, and we are working on locating the donor (I think I know who it is -- a man I have been corresponding with about joining the project for about a month). the most recent ancestor listed is Edward Milo Webb, and one of our Participants is in the process of validating the genealogy to determine the oldest DOCUMENTED ancestor (we have some doubts about the genealogy given DNA results in our Project, which appear to conflict with the claimed pedigree).

2. A second entry has had the alleles identified -- it's CLOSE to both the Giles Webb Group. The pedigree given for this entry goes back to Samuel Webb of Braintree, MA and then to Christopher Webb of Braintree and on back to Sir Henry. I have my doubts about the genealogy being correct on this one, however, we will have to wait until our Christopher Webb descendant's DNA comes in. The few markers we have in common for both are matches.

Abraham Owen Smoot WEBB (UT) < Charles Young WEBB (Franklin, NY > UT) < Samuel Webb (1789, Belmont, Franklin Co, NY - 1855 Malone, Franklin CO, NY < Ebenezer Webb (1757, Windham, CT - 1841 Malone, Franklin co, NY) < Ebenezer (1718 - 1803, Windham, CT) < Samuel Webb (1690 Braintree, MA - 1779, Rockingham, Windham, VT) < Samuel Webb (1660 Braintree - 1738 Windham, CT) < Christopher Webb (1630, Braintree, Norfolk, MA - 1694 Braintree, Norfolk, MA) < Christopher Webb (stratford, Warwickshire, ENGLAND - Braintree, Norfolk, MA)

3. A third lineage, descended from a William Webb (c 1767, England - 06/30/1822, Burnham, Buckinghamshire, England) also appears to be most closely related to 16708. I have written the man who

supplied the pedigree, and I assume he is the DNA donor at this point. Here is the reported lineage:

James Theophilus Webb (09/17/1860, Littlewick, White Waltham, Berkshire, England - 08/16/1911, LA, LA Co, CA) Married 06/27/1884 in Fond Du Lac, Fond Du Lac, WI < Goerge Webb, Jr (11/01/1829, Burnham, Buckinghamshire, England - ?) Married 07/12/1852, White Waltham, Buckinghamshire, England) < George Webb (01/06/1803, Burnham, Buckinghamshire, England - ?) < William Webb (c 1767, England - 06/30/1822, Burnham, Buckinghamshire, England) Married 08/01/1790, Burnham, Buckinghamshire, England

4. Another close relationship to the Giles Webb Group, particularly 16708. This particular DNA sample has some missing values (apparently some segments of the DNA failed to give readable results in the lab). I have potentially found the donor, and I have emailed him asking him to join the Project and also suggesting he upgrade to more markers.

5. Appears to match 18319, only had 26 markers. 18319 informs me this is his father's DNA sample.

6. Appears to be participant 5667 (21/21 match with 5667's father 13791 and pedigree makes it appear to be 5667.

7. Seems to be 18319's own DNA sample.

8. This appears to match our 24158. It is the rare haplogroup G2. I have been looking for folks researching the line, hoping to find the DNA donor.

What to do if you tested at more than one lab:

If you tested at FTDNA and DNAH, enter the values as if they are from DNAH (choose the DNAH circle).

If you tested at FTDNA and Biotix, choose the DNAH circle (all Biotix non-FTDNA markers were converted to DNAH before being posted on our website)

Don't worry if it says you have 1027 matches and only shows 50 -- if there is no WEBB within those 50 it is unlikely the WEBB will be close to your values.

Person Entitled to Draw

- Bachelor, 21 years or over, 1 year residence in Georgia, citizen of United States – 1 draw
- Married man with wife and/or child, 1 year residence in Georgia, citizen of United States – 2 draws
- Widow with child under 21 years, 1 year residence in Georgia – 2 draws
- Orphan or family of orphans under 21 years, with father dead and mother dead or remarried – 1 draw
