NEWS

1. If you are a DNA-Fingerprint customer, please log on to your personal page at DNA-Fingerprint and transfer your data to FTDNA.
2. One of the John Webb-Mary Boone Group has ordered the SNP testing from www.Ethnoancestry.com. I recommend that at least one person from each "group" get this test. These SNP tests go deeper than the FTDNA offered SNP testing. If a group "pools" its resources, the cost is not prohibitive.
3. Ethnoancestry also offers some Y-STRs (some of which are offered in the FTDNA 38-67). Recently some of those have turned up promising for separating R1b sub-clades: DYS492=13 seems to be an indicator of S21+. Now one researcher suggests that DYS575, which is ONLY available through EA, looks promising for separating out subclades of R1b1c. 5% have DYS575=9 and 5% have 575=11, which suggests subclades. However, the researchers frankly need more data points (samples) and extended haplotypes (68 – 115 markers) to be able to determine this and to encourage the company to look for a defining SNP. Therefore, if any of our R1b WEBBs are willing to contribute to science, please order this set of markers from EA!

FAMILIES OF INTEREST: Early GEORGIA WEBBs

The WEBB DNA Project has a number of early GA Webb lineages. These are indicated in the following records by the kit number following the name.

SITUATION: WEBBs in Jefferson Co, GA early 1800s

This is my own lineage. Recently, we have used mtDNA to infer the parentage of Elias Webb (c. 1785, NC – 1850/60, GA?). I am sharing this story with the list, so that they can see how DNA may be used in other than the traditional Y-DNA sense.

R1b This line is related to Edward Webb (1718-1749, Essex Co, VA) and Jesse Webb (1756, Isle of Wight CO,VA – 1837, Franklin Co, NC), 2 TN Webbs, a KY Webb and a New England Webb.

39009 Jesse Webb (1778, NC - 12/19/1842, GA)

5667/5975/13791 Elias Webb (c. 1790 GA? - 1850-60, GA?) 5667 & 13791 are descendants of his son George Washington Webb who was in CA by 1853. 5975 is descended from his son

**William Henry Webb who went from GA to SC (after Civil War) to TX by 1880. 5975 is my own cousin, grandson of my grandfather's brother.
49525 Wilford Newton Webb (c1810 GA/NC - 1870/1880, Holmes Co., FL)**

My oldest documented ancestor is a man named Elias Webb, born c 1785, based on the fact that he first paid tax in Jefferson Co, GA in 1806 and married there 4 May 1809 to Mary Ann "Nancy" MAYNOR (mtDNA H5a). Census data supports this birthdate. On 20 Jul 1809, Jesse Maynor marries Sealy "Sally" Webb.

There are a limited number of WEBBs who could be Elias's father and mother, based on Jefferson County tax records.

1. Rice and Mary Webb who purchase land in Jefferson Co in 1798 on Lambert's Creek, a tributary of the Ogeechee river, on the east side, in an area which was formerly Burke Co, Ga, and possibly later Warren Co, GA. They sell this land in 1799 and move to land on Williamson's Swamp, on the west side of the Ogeechee, in an area taken from Montgomery Co, which was formerly Washington Co, GA in the creation of Jefferson Co, GA. This is land described as "granted Smith, adj McCredie" in the tax records. What is important about the first piece of property is that Mary Ann "Nancy" and Jesse Maynor's father lived in Burke Co, GA on Rocky Creek, a branch of Buckhead Creek east of Waynesboro, GA.
2. Stephen and Ann Webb pay taxes in 1799 on 53 1/2 A on the Ogeechee "granted L. Bozeman"
3. Jesse Webb
4. Some Webb of whom no records are extant.

Jesse Webb is shown by Census data to have been born 1775-1794, making him too young to have fathered Elias Webb c 1785. Thus we are left with Rice & Mary, and Stephen & Ann and some trackless third WEBB wildcard.

The tax records show Elias paying his first taxes in 1806 on "120 ac g McGee **joins R. Webb** on WmSon's Swamp" and Elias pays those taxes on the line after Rice pays taxes (#14 & 15). Stephen Webb is #79. The next year, Rise is #8 and Elias #11, Stephen is #44. After that, the tax records give no clear pattern, with Elias sometimes paying near Rice and sometimes paying near Stephen. [see 1796 map below for Williamson's Swamp]

Jesse Webb marries a Nancy Bozeman. From other paper trail data, we are almost certain that Jesse is Stephen's son. Jesse and Elias Webb lines are 34/37 on Y-DNA, which suggests a more distant relationship than brothers, but of course doesn't prove anything.

In 1790 Stephen and Ann Webb were in Nash Co, NC with 1M>16 4M <16 3F. Rice and Mary Webb were in Franklin Co, NC with 1M>16 2M<16 3F. So, again, either could be Elias's parent.

Given the proximity of Rice Webb to the MAYNOR family, and the fact that Elias and Sealy Webb married a brother/sister pair of MAYNOR's, Elias's oldest son is named Britain Rice Webb and none of his six sons were named Stephen (one of Jesse Webb's was), and the fact that for a couple of years, Elias paid the taxes on Sealy Webb & Jesse MAYNOR's property, the family researchers, felt that Elias and Sealy were probably brother and sister. Could mtDNA help resolve the question of Elias's parentage?

We located a known descendant of Ann Webb -- her daughter Denisy married William Smarr, and their daughter Lorena married Pleasant Culpepper Webb (a descendant of Jesse & Nancy Bozeman Webb). Family folklore always said that Lorena's parents were horrified that she married "such a close cousin." Following the line of Lorena's daughter, we found a woman willing to submit mtDNA.

Rice and Mary Webb moved to Henry Co, AL c. 1821 and appear there on the Census in 1830 (the only WEBBs in the county). Between those times, two WEBB girls, both born in GA according to their later Census data, marry in Henry Co, AL. Their ages in that later Census data fit the 1820 Rice Webb Census perfectly. We followed their lines and located a descendant who agreed to submit mtDNA.

Finally, we tracked down a descendant of Sealy Webb MAYNOR who also agreed to submit mtDNA.

The Ann Webb sample came back as follows:
HVR1 CRS (no differences)
HVR2: 146C; 152C, 263G; 309.1HE**C*; 315.1C;477C

The Mary Webb sample came back as follows:
HVR1: 16519C
HVR2: 146C; 263G, 309.1C; 315.1C; 477C

Finally, the Sealy Webb MAYNOR sample came in:
HVR1: 16519C

HVR2: 146C; 263G, 309.1C; 315.1C; 477C, 750G

I had a heart stopping moment at seeing the 750G, but I have been assured by Ann Turner and Thomas Krahn and others that 750G is typical, and the CRS is the odd mitotype out there. Thomas assured me 09/30/06 that the Mary and Sealy samples match. What are the odds that an unnamed trackless Webb had married Mary Webb's sister? Compared to the odds that Sealy Webb is Mary Webb's daughter?

Therefore, if we come to the conclusion that Elias and Sealy are brother and sister, based on the paper trail data cited above, then the mtDNA data strongly suggests that Rice and Mary Webb are Elias's parents.

I have one trick left up my sleeve. We have Y-DNA from a Wilford Newton Webb, who was living on the Rice and Mary Webb property in Henry Co, AL in the 1840 Census. His line has tested 25 markers, which match the Elias Webb samples 25/25 and the Jesse Webb 23/25. I plan to extend all these folks to 67 markers and perhaps beyond.

There is also a Wylly/Willie/Wylie/Wilie Webb who pops up in Jefferson Co, GA. Based on the fact that after Stephen Webb's death, when Jesse Webb has left the county, Wylly pays the taxes on the same land that Stephen, and then Ann Webb (for 1 year), paid taxes on in prior years, we believe Wylly to be Stephen Webb's son. So I am trying to track down a male WEBB from that line, to see if his Y-DNA will match Jesse's -- or at least share one of the mutations that Elias's descendants don't have. Right now, however, it appears that perhaps only one of his sons survived the Civil War.

Comments welcome.

Another suggestion has also reared its head. Ann Turner, who co-wrote Trace your Roots with DNA with Megan Smolenyak, has suggested that the rare combination of 146C and 477C suggests that Ann Webb and Mary Webb are related.

Ann Webb is almost certainly Mary Ann Peed/Pede/Pead, daughter of Henry Peed and Tabitha Stringer. Her sisters are all accounted for by marriage to non-Webbs. Therefore, the closest possible relationship would be first cousins. Tabitha Stringer is the daughter of Edward Stringer and one of his two wives: (1) Frances Blackstone (2) Judith ?. Probably Frances, given birthdates of Tabitha and the marriage to Judith. I am looking for a descendant of another daughter of Henry Peed and Tabitha Stringer to give mtDNA. Through this I hope to confirm that (1) Ann Webb IS Mary Ann Peed and (2) If Ann & Mary Webb are related, it is no closer than first cousins.

1773 In Wilkes county papers, sales of allotments of ceded lands in 1773 are listed **Richard Webb** and John Webb (document 3). This was a reference you had previously located. **Richard Webb** had 150 acres which apparently was resigned to Henry Younge by 1773 because the cash accounts for the land indicate the land resigned in their payment schedule. In 1779 the estate of Richard Web [sic] deceased was handled in Wilkes county, with Matthew More appointed as administrator. Richard died intestate in 1779.

1773 John **WEBB**, came to Georgia from Virginia, bringing a wife and 7 seven children 5 sons and 2 daughters from twenty to three years. He was granted 400A joining lands on the north side of Broad River upper line of John Coleman, reserved for him. Deposit cost 10pds James Heron's note for 10 pds Resigned to Martin Jollie Oct 15, 1773. [Quoted as being from the Journal of the Augusta Land Court in Jo Smith Webb's LINKAGE]

AWNRDC NOTE: I have not located this grant nor even the JI of Augusta Land Court. Frank Parker Hudson's Wilkes Co, Georgia Tax records 1785-1805 lists John Coleman in Raglan's District (AAA) what is now Elbert Co, GA. According to a Rootsweb archived message on the COLEMAN board, John Coleman from VA left a will 10/22/1778 naming wife Susannah, children James, John, Thomas, Susannah, Charlotte and Elizabeth and the 1785 Coleman is the son John. This is definitely a different parcel of land from the Richard Webb land. This John Coleman appears to be from Mecklenburg Co, VA as per following deed from that county:

DB2, P 126- SEPT, 1768 JAMES COLEMAN & **JOHN COLEMAN** OF MECK. CO. TO ALEXANDER BOYD OF MECK CO, ABT 53.5 AC IN MECK ON COLEMAN'S CRK, WTS: JOHN MCCLEMENT, WM. DECKER, **RICHARD SWEPSON**, DEED ACK. BY **JOHN COLEMAN** & WIFE, **SUSANNAH**. RECD. SEPT. 13, 1768

OTHER NEIGHBORS OF THE COLEMANS IN WILKES CO, SUCH AS THE EASTER FAMILY ARE ALSO FROM MECKLENBURG.

An internet query tells us John Webb received 400 ac of Ceded Lands in 1773, then **Wilkes Co**, now Elbert Co, 15-20 miles up north side of Broad River at Webbs Creek, near Buttrees Creek/Doves Creek/Falling Crk. John was supposedly killed and house burned in 1781 and he is said to be buried on this land overlooking the Broad River.

1773 In records of the Court of Land Commissioners appointed by Governor Wright to issue the "Ceded lands" 1773 - 1775. October 15, 1773, page 5, Webb, John - VA. a wife, 5 sons, 2 daus, (from 20 to 3 years old). 400 acres north side of **Broad River** adj. upper line of John Coleman, reserved for him. Resigned to Martin Jolly.

Richard is said to be "of Virginia" and arrived with 5 sons and 2 daughters.

Neighbors historically, Wilkes, Greene, Jackson, Elbert, Oglethorpe, Habersham and Hall.

1785 State of **Georgia** land grant issued to Jesse Webb for 287-½ acres land on Big Shole Creek, Franklin County, **Georgia**, bounded by Moses Miller north westward and vacant land all other sides. It was issued on 4 January 1785 and registered 14 January 1785. Jesse Webb's 287-½ acres bounty was registered in book A, folio 12 and recorded Libeer B folio 133, no. 398.

Big Shoal Creek is described in several deeds and wills in manners similar to the following: mouth of **Big Shoal Creek** to the waggon Road and up the ridge bet the River Tugalo and the said creek. [1794 Will of Robert Walters]

Other records suggest it is now in Jackson, or Oglethorpe Co.

Using a topographic map, one would think that a ridge between Big Shole and the River Tugalo would suggest that Big Shole runs in another direction than the Tugalo.

I am creating a map of these early land grants, using the 1785 militia districts map from FP Hudson's Wilkes County, GA Tax Records book.

Placing John Webb's piece of Property was a bit difficult. I was unable to find a map which showed either Webb's Creek or William's Fork of the Oconee. However, I did find a nice 1795 map showing Franklin, Wilkes, and Greene Counties in the Library of Congress online collection [http://lcweb2.loc.gov/ammem/gmdhtml/gmdhome.html, Choose General Maps, Search for Georgia, choose this map, maximize the size and use the ZOOM in feature to see the area under discussion – this will be the upper right hand side, more or less]

ERROR to the circuit **court** for the district of Georgia, in a suit in equity, in which Pendleton and **Webb** were complainants, against Emanuel Wambersie, James Seagrove, and the representative of James Armstrong, Jacob **Weed**, and Henry Osborne, were defendants.

The bill stated that Henry Osborne, Jacob **Weed**, James Armstrong, James Seagrove, and the complainant John **Webb**, on the 22d of December, 1786, entered into an agreement with each other, under seal, to procure lands on their joint account in the state of Georgia, to an amount not exceeding 200,000 acres, at

their joint expense, and for their joint benefit. That grants were obtained for about 165,000 acres. That **Webb** by deed transferred all his right to the lands and contract to John M'Queen, in consideration of 400l. sterling, to be paid in four equal annual instalments. That M'Queen, not having paid **Webb**, assigned his right to Pendleton, the complainant, who undertook to indemnify M'Queen against **Webb's** demand. That **Webb** has never received the money due from M'Queen. That Wambersie, as agent for the company, had sold 60,000 acres of the land in Holland, at one dollar and fifty-six cents per acre, had received in cash 51,000 dollars, and had

made himself liable for the balance. That he has refused to pay to the complainant, Pendleton, the one-fifth of the purchase money. That the other defendants refuse to divide the residue of the lands, and to account for the profits, &c. That the lands are liable, in the hands of the purchasers, for the balance of the purchase money, both to the complainant **Webb**, for the purchase money due to him, and to the complainant Pendleton for his one-fifth of the amount of the sales. The bill seeks a discovery of the amount of lands granted to the company, of the amount sold, &c. and prays that the defendants may account, and that the lands may be charged with the balance of the purchase money, &c.

The defendants demurred for want of equity in the bill, and the **court** below sustained the demurrer, and decreed that the bill be dismissed, with costs.

But this **court**, without argument, overruled the demurrer, reversed the decree, and remanded the cause for further proceedings. <http://supreme.justia.com/us/8/73/>

Said Indians also wounded one Sampson Bunn and killed nine milk cows and cut out their tongues. On 4 November 1778 said Cherokee Indians again attacked fort Nail where this declarant was stationed. The Indians wounded one **THOMAS MOFFIT** and took and carried away captive a little nephew of this declarant by the name of Claiborne Bellamy."

Fort Nail was on the Broad River in Wilkes Co GA. A history of Georgia, however, suggests that it may have been the Creeks rather than the Cherokees who attacked in late 1778. <http://users.waymark.net/shmartonak/m1doc6.htm>
