### TECHNICAL NOTES AND NEWS

#### Ancestry.com

Ancestry. Com has bought out Relative Genetics, one of the major testing firms. Relative Genetics Projects and customers, unless they opted out, will have their data transferred to Ancestry.com. They also advertise that they will accept test results from other firms if you register and enter your data. Note: I suspect that even if you enter your data to do a search, your DNA will be "captured" by their software and treated as part of their database, since this happened at Relative Genetics.

First impression might be "GREAT! I can look for matches!" However, be warned that some day they may match this up with their trees, which as many of you know, are sometimes complete garbage. One of the great advantages of DNA is that it allowed us to double-check the assumptions made by earlier genealogists without the internet or DNA and catch where they picked up on the wrong John Webb or William Webb. If DNA gets paired up with a messed up tree, we lose this advantage.

The second potential problem is that this is a disincentive for folks to join our project, since they can test through Ancestry.com and search there. The problem for you is that if they do that, they have no incentive to actually share their data and research with you as they do by belonging to the project. Nor are they obligated to respond to attempts by you to contact them.

Finally, Ancestry.com has a track record of making a service available for you to "share," then collecting it and offering it for sale. The worst scenario I can imagine is having the DNA I paid for, or my cousin paid for, collected, matched up with a tree full of errors, available to others who won't necessarily share their data with me or even respond to my emails trying to contact them, and then one day see a book for sale full of my research, the errors from the Ancestry.com tree – purporting to all be "DNA proven!"

I am not submitting any of my personal DNA to Ancestry.com because of this. I love their Census and original records services and use them on almost a daily basis. However, because I misunderstood how to enter some tree data, my own WEBB line is on their World Tree with a man listed as his own son's son (simply because of their name similarity) and I have been unable to get anyone at Ancestry.com to help me correct what was a data entry error. I shudder to think about getting the DNA associated with that messed up tree and then having it sold to people in that condition.

I may be worried about nothing, but an ounce of prevention...and you can use your own judgement. I have outlined the potential dangers, which I feel is my responsibility to do.

Anyone interested in purchasing a DNA kit through Ancestry.com will be eligible to be a member of the WEBB DNA Project. You should also be advised that if you choose this route, there is a 15% discount available at this time. Please contact me if you wish to purchase a kit through Ancestry, so I can obtain the discount for you.

### **Family Tree DNA – Annual Conference**

Two major announcements out of the Family Tree DNA Conference held this month in Houston:

#### **1. New Phylogenetic Tree from Dr. Hammer**

Conference attendees were presented with a copy of a new phylogenetic tree containing a number of new SNPs for Y-DNA. The major impacts this will have on you is that:

- a. there will be new SNP tests available when the tree has been published in the academic journals (estimated about 4 months from now I believe) . I know nothing about pricing yet.
  - b. Some of you may now have a new sub-clade designation even if you don't take the new tests because some of the sub-clades have been re-named.
  - c. If you bought one of the old charts, the new one will presumably be available for purchase when the new SNPs are available.
2. Random Walk through the Y- Chromosome presentation by Dr. Thomas Krahn

This is a new product offered by FTDNA to those customers who are interested in advancing the rate of SNP discovery in order to subdivide haplogroups. I do not have pricing on it yet either, but it will not be inexpensive, and there is no guarantee that anything will be discovered. However, for those of you who have been longing, for instance, to find something else to replace the \* after R1b1c in your haplogroup designation, it offers an opportunity to be a part of a search organized in a scientific way.

Dr. Krahn has isolated the section of the Y-Chromosome which has the highest density of SNPs found to date. These have been discovered not by surveying this entire section of the Y-DNA but more or less by "accident" in the lab.

For some time, a number of people in the genetic genealogy community have been doing research within the haplogroup projects, especially R1b, looking for clusters of haplotypes that seem to have distinct features in the STR alleles. [I have reported on some of this research to you before, notably Ken Northwaite for I (knordvedt webpages), Ron Scott's webpages on R STR "types", Leo Little's "null" study, etc.] This group of people, and those of us test-takers for whom the research is fascinating, have been clamoring for a way to look for SNPs they believe must exist.

With the recent publication of James Watson's and Craig Ventner's whole genomes (Ventner's cost: \$70million to sequence) and the predictions that the cost has now declined to about \$300,000 per person, some of the genetic genealogy community has been discussing what that foretold for their research, in terms of costs. Clearly, whole genome sequencing is out of the range of most people. Ventner recently estimated SNP discovery would take something like 1000 whole genomes (or was it 10,000?). At any rate, that is still quite expensive. "So why not just the Y-Chromosome?" Became the question. Dr Krahn's presentation is the answer to that, and outlines what he feels to be a more cost effective solution which will potentially have a shorter "payoff" by producing a new SNP.

A brief outline is that sequencing the whole Y-chromosome is probably still too expensive and time-consuming, and probably pointless, as there are large sections in which the primers probably won't bind or the pattern of chemicals simply are unlikely to mutate. So he has proposed instead that shorter sections of the Y-Chromosome become the focus of scrutiny. He has also proposed a strategy for approaching the search.

The Conference is barely over, and ideas about "what cluster shall we start with? How will we finance it?" already sizzle on the Genealogy-DNA list grill. For the fact is it still will not be within the range of a single testee or a pair of them.

There is no guarantee that the first round of testing will discover anything. A rather loose analogy might be this:

You set off from Point A in one of those old fashioned railroad hand pumped maintenance cars, looking for something a passenger claims was "dropped out of the train window somewhere between Point A and Point Z in a long journey, but they think it happened between "point A and Point B" Now it may turn out the passenger was mistaken it was "dropped out of the window" before point B, however, right now, your job is to run back along the line between Point A and Point B looking for it. Chances are high you will arrive back at Point A hot, tired, sweaty, and cursing the passenger without whatever valuable possession the passenger seeks. However, you now know it is NOT along the track from A – B, and when someone calls back to Point A from Point C, then you can set off along the A-C track looking for it. You may arrive at C equally empty-handed and then someone else will have to search from Point C- Point D.

This search is still going to be expensive compared to 12 Y-DNA markers or even FGS mtDNA testing. It may not "pay off" right away. Each round of testing will compound the expense. However, eventually it should pay off in some way for some of us.

They may discover some kind of "private SNP" that separates two branches of a surname project within the last 300 years, or they may discover several SNPs that chop that big old R1b1c\* "lump" into little bite-sized pieces. There's simply no way to tell right now.

## **Early Virginia WEBBs – Elias (NLT 1639 – 1697) and Katherine \_\_?\_ (1) Knott (2) Webb**

Elias Webb of Rappahannock Co, VA died leaving a will recorded in Essex Co, VA (although he lived in Westmoreland Co) dated 07/24/1697.

Mentions his wife Katherine, who is deceased byt listed in Deed.

Daughter Jane (c. 1660 - ) m (1) John Vickers (2) Thomas Carnall [there may be some error here]

Daughter Elizabeth (c 1660 - ) m David Browne

Daughter Sarah ( c 1660 - ) m ?

Son Elias (who died before his father)

Katherine was the widow of John Knott, as a deposition in the Westmoreland Co records show a deposition by Thomas Speedy that John Knott had made a verbal will to leave all to his wife Katherine on 03/22/1659. An inventory of Knott's estate in the Westmoreland records dated 05/27/1660 is sworn to by Elias Webb, who married the "relict" of Knott. Thus we can estimate that Elias Webb was at least 21 by 1660, therefore born No Later Than (NLT) 1639. A birth year of 1639 would make Elias Webb about 58 when he died in 1697

The First Webb Outlaw in America -- Elias Webb of Charles City County, VA. -- 1650s

Elias Webb defied, eluded, and frustrated Sheriff Charles Sparrow, whom some viewed as an overzealous persecutor -- abusive in his office

Charles City County, VA, Court Orders 1655-1658

(Charles City County was just across the river from part of Surry and Isle of Wight. Many of the records of Charles City County, VA, are of people who actually lived in Surry or Isle of Wight, or who eventually moved there. Because of the Indian threat south of the James River, many of the settlers as far away as Nansemond at least temporarily moved north of the river to Northumberland or Charles City.)

1655 -- page 14 It is ordered that Richard Wells shall prepare and bring in place sufficient timber for eight tunne of cask ready malled, barked, and ined, whereof Ellias Webb is ordered and appointed to make four tunne of cask and deliver the same first to the said Wells by the last day of October next als exec. And this to be conclusive between them.

Page 82. Abstract. Elias Webb arrested at suit of Chas. Sparrow, for 420 lb. tobo., failing to appear and no bail taken, Capt. Daniell Llewelin, sherif, ordered to bring the person or estate of Webb to next court or pay.

Page 95. Ordered that the court make good the debt and damage against Capt. Daniell Lewellin for the escape of Elias Webb for want of a prison according to act. Page 116. The order obtained by Capt. Daniell Llewelin late sherr agst the court for the escape of Elias Webb is reversed and made voyd and the sd escape appearing by default and neglect of the sd sherriffs officer Mr. Charles Sparrow plt agst Webb is left to the benefit of his proceedings agst the sd sherr.

Col. Peter Ashton by virtue of this deputation from Col. Miles Carey, Escheator General, Mar 8, 1663/4, and granted to Elias Webb by an escheate patent 30 April 1664. Elias Webb at his decease left one son Elias and three daughters, Jane, Elizabeth and Sarah- His son Elias dying before his father in his minority the above tract fell successively to the three sisters as co-heirs. David Browne married with Elizabeth, one of the daughters and co-heirs- Signed by David Browne and Elizabeth Browne. Elizabeth relinquished her right of dower- 1697-

## **SORTING OUT THE WEBBs – Prince Edward County Webbs (Part 1)**

This research suggestion was brought to me by one of our terrific researchers who wrote:

I know that an Edward/Edmund Webb moved there from Buckingham Co and then headed west at one point- there are others in the county and are they related,etc ?  
What happened to these Webbs? I know that Ed wound up in Ky, but did he go anywhere in between and did the others stay or go to North Carolina or where? We have these gaps and I really wish I could get access to the deeds of that area

Some of the following may conflict with Bobby Lamb's research on his line. **Anyone with the Brunswick deeds who can supply them to me and therefore to these researchers with citations will earn our everlasting gratitude.** What I have here, I GOOGLE'd off the web and looked up in the Library of VA online database (with the exception of the Census information).

According to the chart in Nonie Webb & Winnie Whitaker's new Merry Webb Book, Prince Edward County was created in 1754 from Amelia County, which was created in 1735 from Brunswick (1732 from Prince George (created in 1703 from Charles City County, one of the 8 original shires)). NOTE: The Brunswick Co, VA website says it was created in 1720, but the government was not organized until 1732, according to another site. [WWW.rootsweb.com](http://WWW.rootsweb.com) Brunswick Co site says that in 1732 part of Surry and Isle of Wight were added to Brunswick County.

QUESTION: Is there a map anywhere that shows what portions of Surry and Isle of Wight were added to Brunswick Co, VA?

Now that I'm all set up with my maps, and my county formation, I will start with the Edmund Webb our researcher mentioned.

**Brunswick Co., VA** Source: Will Book 4, Pt 2

"Will of William MOSELEY 29 Nov 1771 25 Aug 1776 Of Meherrin Parish.

To my son Levy

To my wife.all my personal estate to be divided among all my children.

Ex: my 2 sons William MOSELY & \*Samuel MOSELY

Wit: Edmund WEBB, \*WILLIAM HOLLOWAY, Thomas CLANTON, Edward CLANTON.

Fully probated 23 Sep following. Probate indicates that the sd excrs qualified with Benjamin MOSELY & John BECK their securities."

- From this we know that Edmund Webb was born NLT 1750, as you had to be 21 at that time to witness deeds and wills  
in VA, if my memory of the laws then serves me.

26nov1774

Isaac LEDBETTER of **Brunswick Co.** to CHARLES LEATH of Northampton Co., NC for 150 pounds **VA** money 400ac where said Isaac Ledbetter now lives, joining FLETCHER, CLANTON's BRANCH, BROWN, BLALOCK\*\*\*, BEDDINGFIELDS, the old road.

Wits: **Edmund WEBB**, Wm BRYANT.

- This suggests that at this time, Edmund Webb was close to the Brunswick Co line with Northampton Co, NC, a wedge of which became Warren Co, NC in 1779.

In 1774 an Elizabeth Webb left a will pp, 207-209, Will, pro 25 July 1774. Will Book 4, 1761-1777 (Reel 21). Part of index to Brunswick Co Wills and Administrations (1732-1800) [this is not Edmund's wife!]

We find Doctor Collier buying a farm from Thomas Burnett on 23 Aug. 1771 (Bru Co Deed Book 10 pg 225), he sold this farm to **Edmund Webb** on 31 Dec. 1777 (Bru Co Deed Book 13 pg 24). [From a Collier family website I googled]

This Indenture made this 18th day of January... one thousand seven hundred and seventy-seven between Thomas Clanton of Brunswick County and Colony of Virginia of the one part and Thomas Haynes of the County Surry and Colony aforesaid of the other part... for and in consideration of the sum of three hundred pounds... paid by the said Thomas Haynes the receipt whereof he the said Thomas Clanton doth hereby acknowledge... by these presents do grant bargain & sell unto the said Thomas Haynes or that tract or parcel of land he the said Clanton purchased of the Executors of James Worthy dec'd containing by estimation two hundred and fifty acres... and bounded as followeth (to wit) beginning at a white oak on the East side of Lizard Creek where the country line crosses, thence East along the said line & adjoining the land of John Lynch to where the country line crosses the Rocky Branch, thence northward up the said branch to John Becks corner black jack tree at William Moseley's line, thence West along the said line to a corner white oak, thence North along the said Moseley's line to wit or white oak on the side of the little branch, thence West along the said Moseley's line to the forementioned Lizard Creek, thence down the said creek to the beginning... signed by Thomas Clanton (bhm) and witnessed by Lewis Williamson, Edmund **Webb**, Isham Reaves, John Beck, William Moseley, and William Hamilton. Brunswick Court 23rd of April 1781. This Indenture was proved by the oath of William Hamilton

a witness thereto & having been proved on the 28th day of July 1777 by the oath of Edmund **Webb** another witness and also on the 22nd of December 1777 by the oath of Isham Reaves eight third witnessed the same is ordered to be recorded. [Order Book 2, page 145, Brunswick County, Virginia]

KNOW ALL MEN by these Presents that we John Flood Edmunds, Charles Edmunds, and **Edmund Webb** of the County of Brunswick are held and firmly bound unto the Treasurer of the Commonwealth of Virginia in the sum of one hundred thousand pounds . . . jointly and severally firmly by these Presents sealed with our seals and dated this twenty second Day of January 1781. THE CONDITIONS of the above obligation is such that of the above bound John Flood Edmund during the continuance in the Office of Sheriff shall truly and faithfully collect pay and account for all duties and Taxes within the County of Brunswick aforesaid Imposed In Virtue of an Act of Assembly passed at the last Session in May last past entitled an act for calling in and redeeming the money now in circulation and for comiting (sic) and funding new Bills of Credit according to the resolutions of the Congress of the eighteenth of March last, then the above obligation to be void else to remain in full force. Signed by John Flood Edmunds, Charles Edmunds, and **Edmund Webb**. At a Court held for Brunswick County the 22d Day of January 1781. The Bond was acknowledged by the obligors thereto and Ordered to be Recorded. Deed Book 14, page 91.

Also in the Library of VA I find that Edmund Webb was Qtrmaster to the Brunswick militia. Public Service Claims. Court Booklets and Lists (reels 104) arranged by County. Court Booklet p 47 [1781-3?] This tells me that Edmund Webb was probably a tad older, to have held this position in 1781-3, so I move his birth date back, NLT 1760-62. He is also mentioned in the Commissioner's book(s): I, p. 132

I find a John Webb resident of Brunswick County, listed in Court booklet(s). p. 72 and a Micajah Webb listed in Court booklets Brunswick County.

This Indenture made this 13th day of November 1783 BETWEEN Thomas Burnitt and Sarah his wife of the County of Brunswick and State of Virginia of the one part and Edmund Webb of the County and State aforesaid of the other part . . . for and in consideration of the sum of one hundred and twenty-five pounds . . . doth grant, bargain and sell unto the said Edmund Webb . . . all that tract or parcel of land lying and being in the County of Brunswick in State aforesaid containing by estimation two hundred and twenty-one acres . . . and is adjoining and bounded by the lands of Edmund Webb, Herbert Haines, Peter Read, John Barker & Lewis Duprey . . . signed by Thos. Burnett (by his mark) and Sarah Burnett. Witnesses were John Barker, Joice Webb, James Harrison, Mark Steed and Grief Harwell. Brunswick County Court October 24th 1791. This Indenture of Bargain & Sale was proved by the oath of Grief Harwell a witness thereto and having been proved on the 22nd day of March 1784 by the oaths of James Harrison and Mark Steed also witnesses thereto the same is ordered to be recorded. Deed Book 15, page 149.

- Is Joice Edmund's wife? Or is this the name which becomes "Jolly?"
- This deed is important, because it tells us that Edmund Webb already owned land in Brunswick Co, VA prior to 1783

I find, at the University of Virginia online patents database, that on 18 October 1785 Edmund Webb was granted a patent of "212 acres in Meherrin Parish on the branches of Peahill Creek," in Brunswick County. Land Office Grants R, 1785, p. 552 (reel 58).

Description: Beginning @ Peter Singlair's corner along his line N 65° E 132 poles to McGehe's (?) corner hickory bush thence along his lines N 87° 152 poles to a Pine in Herod (?) Clary's line thence along his line S 46½° W 78 p[oles] to a Pint S 25° W 18 p crossing a branch the line between Clary & William Lynch thence along the said Lynches line is the same course 64 p to Pine S 20° W 42 poles to a tea ash(?) S 2° W 70 p to a small Spanish Oak S 34° E 43 p to Buckner Pace's (?) corner red oak thence along his line S 10° W 114 p to a Turkey Oak on Whitby's Branch then up said branch to John Whitby's corner scrub Oak thence along line 51° W 114 p to a blackjack W 78 p to his and Hezekiah Thrower's corner sweet gum on the Stony lick Branch thence along his line N 22° E 62 p to a scrub oak N 58° E 6 p to the beginning.

- Now just where the peahill is Peahill Creek? I offer the following deed from 1753, although there are others at the link below it which nail down Peahill Creek and Lizzard's Roost as being in NORTH CAROLINA, not Virginia at all! Please note

**July 25 1753** James Reavese (also Reavease), Sr. "of Northampton County" bought from John Avent of Surry County, Virginia 320 acres on **Peahill Creek** in Northampton Co, NC. Witnesses were Thomas Reavise, Henry (X) Williams, and Foster (R) Reavise.

In another 1785 patent, Henry Tiller/Tillor is granted a patent as "assignee of Henry Thrower a certain Traitor." Survey dated 5/20/1783. ### **Irwin County**

DR. R.D. SINCLAIR, 1802-1862

R.D. Sinclair was born March 6, 1802 in York District, South Carolina. Dr. Sinclair came to Zion Hope Community looking for a home. He bought a farm and had a house built. He returned to Albany for one year, then came to live in the Zion Hope Community in 1848. Dr. and Mrs. Sinclair and their seven children lived on a farm located about one mile northeast of the present Abraham Baldwin College. From there he practiced medicine for miles around. He helped, in 1859, to constitute the Zion Hope Baptist Church, which is located about one mile west of the old Sinclair farm. This farm was then located in Irwin County, and Tifton was then in Berrien County, but the farm has been in Tift County since Tift County was created in 1905. Dr. Sinclair was the third person buried in the Zion Hope Church cemetery. He died June 11, 1862. Mr. Elias L. Webb states that as far as he knows, his grandfather, Dr. R.D. Sinclair, was the first medical doctor in this immediate section of Georgia. The George, Henry, and **Elias Webb** families are descendants of Dr. Sinclair.
